\$42,000 OFFERED WINNERS AT FAIR

Premium lists for the 1941 Oregon state fair, caught in the deluge of printing due to the new laws, are now being distributed to several thousand potential exhibitors. The list for the 80th fair—September 1 to 7, inclusive—offers more than \$42,000 in premiums.

The total cash prizes for open class competition are about the same as last year and will be distributed in these departments: Draft horses, beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, pigeons, rabbits, honey and bees, fruits and vegetables, grains, seeds, art, flowers, baking and textiles. Another division, photographic art carries ribbons only.

Separate premium lists for both the Future Farmers and the 4-H clubbers will be off the press about July 1st.

Awards in the poultry show will be continued on the same basis as in 1940, when these premiums were set up on an entirely new plan. However, poultry premiums have been boosted in some instances.

Banners for premier breeder and premier exhibitor in all breeds of draft horses and cattle will be awarded by the judges. Also in the grain show, honey show, fruit show and floral show sweepstakes banners will be awarded.

In addition to the cash premiums to be paid by the fair, a record number of special awards have been offered by breed associations. Also a number of specials are offered for the winners in domestic baking and canning competitions.

All entries on livestock should be in the fair office at Salem not later than August 23; the deadline for poultry entries is August 26th.

The fair management urges that old exhibitors as well as new ones read the premium book carefully this year, as a number of changes in rules and regulations have been made.

THIS WEEK IN DEFENSE

The House voted for an amendment to the 1942 Army appropriation bill to prohibit the payment of funds to any individual or company failing within 10 days to abide by Mediation Board recommendations for settlement of disputes. The Senate approved a declaration that strikes or lockouts in defense industries are "contrary to sound public policy."

The Mediation Board announced settlement of three labor disputes, including the dispute of the soft coal industry. The U. S. Conciliation Service announced settlement of 34 additional disputes.

Selective Service

Selective service headquarters ordered reclassification of all registrants "impeding the defense program." The order said "the citizen who has been deferred because of the job he is performing in the national defense program cannot expect to retain the status of deferment when he ceases to work on the job for which he was deferred."

Ships

The OPM granted full priority for materials necessary in the building of 289 merchant ships for U. S. and Great Britain and the 312 special lease-lend vessels.

OPM Production Director Biggers, speaking at Quebec, said "almost every ship now building in our rapidly expanding yards is ahead of schedule." The Maritime Commission directed the Southern Pacific Company to deliver for national defense purposes its entire fleet of 10 vessels (66,600 tons), formerly used in coastwise trade.

Lease-Lend Aid

President Roosevelt reported to congress that \$75,202,425 of war materials have been transferred to the democracies since enactment of the lease-lend law and \$4,277,412,879 has been allocated for further aid out of the \$7,000,000,000 provided by Congress. He said that work has started on agreements with foreign governments on the terms and conditions of the aid they receive.

Civilian Defense

Civilian Defense Director LaGuardia stated organization of medical groups, auxiliary police and fire units, sanitation, and first aid squads are the necessary basis for adequate home defense. He said panic is to be avoided under all circumstances and it will be necessary to educate the public to the absolute necessity of obeying instructions.

OPM announced it will soon begin a nation-wide campaign to collect scrap aluminum from civilians. A test drive in Richmond, Virginia, and at Madison, Wisconsin, it was said, produced enough of the metal to build 16 pursuit planes or two and one-half bombers.

Oil

Defense Petroleum Coordinator Ickes told a press conference that curbs on petroleum consumption along the Atlantic coast appear inevitable but the degree of restriction would depend on public cooperation in conserving oil and gasoline. He said the American Automobile association has pledged a campaign to cut down consumption of gasoline by motorists by slower driving, elimination of hasty "getaways" in traffic, and proper engine adjustments. He said Bureau of Standards tests showed a car which gets 18 miles to the gallon at 30 m.p.h. will get only 8.6 miles to the gallon at 80.

Power

The Federal Power commission reported "many areas of the country are now . . . facing power shortages. . . Unless orders are placed immediately for large amounts of additional capacity for 1943, serious shortages will develop. . ."

OPM Director General Knudsen announced OPM has formally approved the St. Lawrence Waterway and Power Project "as part of the all-out defense effort." The President allotted \$200,000 for construction of a cooperative transmission system to carry power from the Pensacola Dam to 15 REA cooperatives in Kansas, Arkansas, Missouri, and Oklahoma to provide for development of zinc deposits for defense.

Priorities

Administrator Henderson, of the office of price administration and civilian supply, arranged with the industries concerned to prevent unjustified price increases in coffee, plywood, paper board, crude oil, gasoline and automobiles. Mr. Henderson told certain auto firms to withdraw recently announced price rises because they "are inconsistent with the favorable earning position of the industry."

OPM placed borax and boric acid, aluminum scrap, zinc, copper, and synthetic rubber under full priority control. OPAC announced programs to allocate sufficient quantities of these materials for essential civilian needs. Vice President Wallace, speaking in Washington, said the democratic way is for each citizen to put off non-essential purchases until after the emergency so that

more material will be available for defense.

Defense Housing

Defense Housing Coordinator Palmer announced there have been completed 14,293 defense dwelling units in 55 localities of 26 states and territories. Speaking to the Conference for national housing inventory, Mr. Palmer said it may be necessary to ask congress for an additional \$500,000,000 to construct 125,000 homes in defense areas in addition to the 97,000 already contracted for.
