Timely Recipes

Here are two cherry dessert recipes that will prove to be favorites with your family:

Cherry-Cheese Pie.

2 cups pitted cherries
1 1/2 tbsps quick-cooking tapioca
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 cup butter
4 ounces cream cheese
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 tsp salt

Combine cherries, tapioca, sugar and salt; let stand 15 minutes. Blend butter and cheese; cut into flour sifted with salt. Press into a firm ball and roll slightly on floured surface; line 9-inch pie pan. Fill with cherry mixture. Crisscross top with pastry strips. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg.) for 45 minutes.

Cherry Whip.

1 cup pitted cherries
1 cup blanched almonds or other nuts
1 cup marshmallows
1 cup marshmallows cut in cubes
1 cup whipping cream
Chill all the ingredients and mix with whipped cream just before serving.

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WHEN SHOULD A ROAST BE SALTED?
Salt your roast whenever you find it convenient, before you put it in the oven, when you take it out, or at any time between. In fact, you needn't salt it at all. You can be a thorough individualist about salting a roast! For steaks and chops, the rule is that they should be salted after they are browned. Salt has a tendency to draw out the juices of meat, but in the case of a roast, with its small proportion of exposed surface, this doesn't make much difference. As for the idea that the salt will "cook into" the meat, this doesn't seem so important because salt penetrates only a short distance into the meat anyway. Most cooks find that seasoning a roast before it is put into the oven is the most convenient way.

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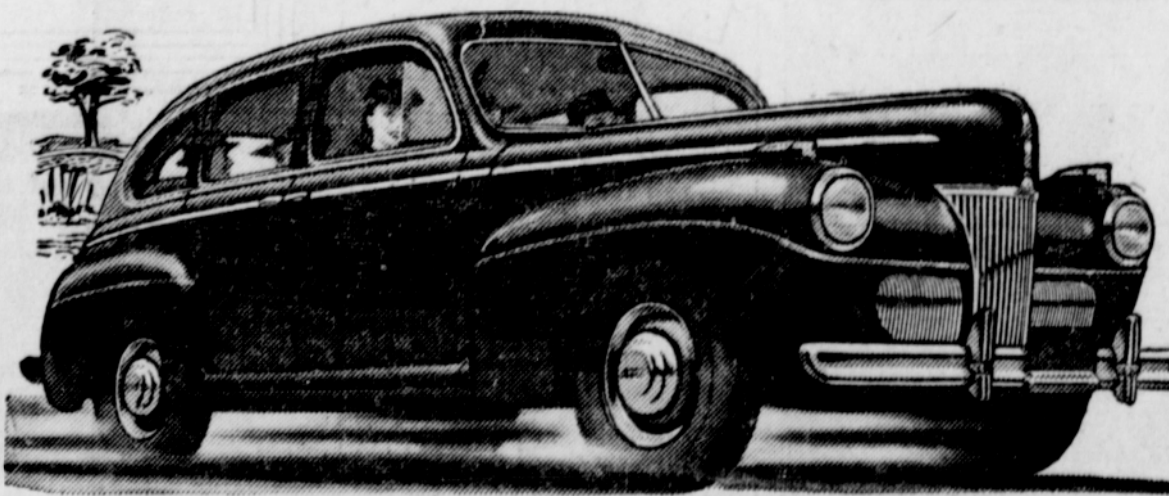
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
