A complete course in the safe handling of fire arms will be conducted at the camp for both boys and girls under the direction of Lt. Sloan, Field Manager of the National Rifle Association of America.

Personal supervision of the course will be under G. M. Upshaw, a resident of Lane county, who will give his services for the benefit of the Lane county club members. Mr. Upshaw has just returned from Corvallis where he assisted Lt. Sloan in conducting the largest school in riflery ever held in the United States. The enrollment at the summer school at Corvallis exceeded any previous enrollment by 200 participants.

Mr. Upshaw has been a member of seven international rifle teams and eight national rifle teams. He holds records with both rifle and pistol and has diplomas as an instructor from the United States army as both a basic and an advanced instructor.

Club members participating in the riflery course must have the permission of their parents and all members competing will be eligible for medal awards furnished by the National Rifle Association.

For the size of the delegation competing in the course at Corvallis, Lane County 4-H members turned in the highest percentage of grade A targets.

Club members planning on attending the Fall Creek 4-H camp should get their enrollment in to the county club agent as soon as possible.
