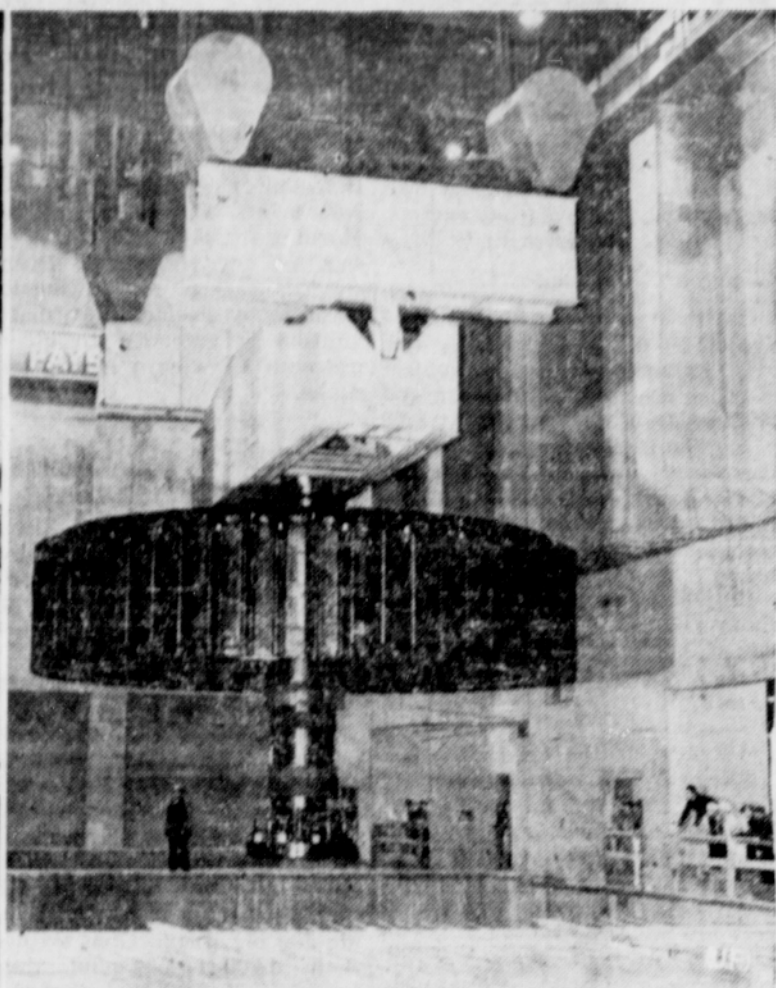

Preparedness Program Affects the Earnings of Pacific Tel. and Tel. Co.

N. R. Powley, president of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, issued a statement today in connection with the release of the dividend checks to shareholders in which he commented on the indicated adverse effect on the company's earnings due to its huge plant construction program—in excess of 50 per cent over last year—now totaling more than \$70,000,000, heavy increased wage payments recently effective and the forthcoming substantial tax increases.

In further commenting on the statement to the shareholders, Mr. Powley stated:

"Throughout the entire Pacific coast we are making huge plant additions to meet the extraordinary service requirements involved in the defense preparedness and the accelerated tempo of business activity. Our working forces have been considerably increased in number and we now have in excess of 35,000 employees or over 5,000 more than a year ago. We have the highest payroll in the history of the company.

"National defense considerations, in their full importance, have been prominently in the foreground throughout all our activities during the year. Our resources, facilities and personnel have been and are all directed toward our company playing its full, effective and patriotic part in our country's defense program. We take justifiable pride in the spirit and competence with which our entire personnel is meeting all of these activities."
