Must Obtain Permits to Hunt or Trap Fur-bearing Animals Says Game Laws

All traps set for wild animals that may be trapped legally must be marked with a brand approved by and registered with the Oregon State Game commission, under provisions of a law passed by the 1941 legislature. Applications for brand approval and registration are now being received at the Portland office of the commission.

Landowners or lessees of land may use unbranded traps for unprotected nongame animals. In this regard, landowners or lessees must register the location of their land and obtain a permit to hunt or trap fur-bearing animals but there will be no fee charged for this permit.

While the resident trappers must continue to pay a \$3 license fee, non-resident trappers must obtain a license costing \$25 before trapping fur-bearing animals in Oregon.

Another provision of the new law requires that warning signs shall be posted in conspicuous places within 50 feet of all traps larger than No. 5 or with a jaw spread of more than 10 inches.

The 1941 trapping season will

be during the same period as heretofore, from November 15 to February 15. Mink, otter and muskrats are the only fur-bearers that may be taken. This does not apply, however, to predatory animals such as cougar, wolves, wildcats, coyotes, skunk, badger, weasel and civet cats, which may be killed at any time of the year.

There is an all-year closed season on beaver, raccoon, fisher, marten and ringtail cat.

August F. Schultz Dies at Portland Home June 22nd

News of the death of August Frederick Schultz, 93, which occurred in Portland June 22, reached the Sentinel too late for publication in our issue of June 26th. Mr. Schultz, who was well known to the old timers here, built the first flour mill operated here. The mill built and operated by Mr. Schultz was on the same location as the Cottage Grove Flour mill, now operated by George Matthews. In 1882 he sold the mill to George Garoutte and ran it a few months. Later he built and operated mills at Canyonville, Phoenix, Ashland and Jefferson and in 1896 purchased the Brownsville woolen mills. He retired from business in 1907 and established a home in Portland, where he lived for thirty years.

His death occurred on June 22 following a six weeks illness. Death was caused from a fall, in which he suffered a broken hip and the injury was followed by pneumonia. He was a native of Germany, coming to the United States at the age of sixteen.

Surviving are three children: J. W. Schultz of Roseburg, who was born here; Mrs. Bertha Carl of Jefferson and George F. Schultz of Portland.
