The three-day celebration is a triennial affair, commemorating the conquering of the frontier by the doughty daredevils of the 1800's.

WESTERN LANE PLANS EVENT FOR JULY 12.

Saturday, July 12th, 1941, has been designated as the day on which all of the state of Oregon will pay tribute to Jessie M. Honeyman of Portland, the occasion being the dedication of the Jessie M. Honeyman Memorial park, a \$25,000 project to which Mrs. Honeyman has subscribed very liberally and on which the U. S. Government and the state park commission have expended vast sums for improvements.
