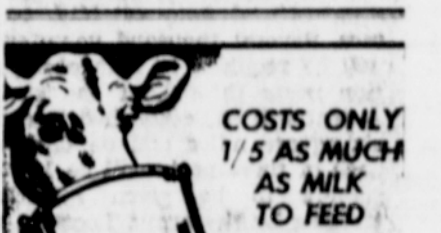

NON-METALLICS IN OREGON.

Oregon's 1940 non-metallic mineral production was valued at over \$5,750,000, according to a report just issued by the State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, Earl K. Nixon, director. This report, GMI Short Paper No. 5, gives results of a survey made by C. P. Holdrege, consulting geologist, who was employed by the department to do the field work and compile the report. Non-metallic minerals produced were sand, gravel, crushed rock, limestone, clay, silica, coal, diatomite, pumice, semi-precious gem stones, and mineral water.

The report analyzes the survey statistics and contains much information on Oregon's non-metallic mineral resources. The production of non-metals according to geographical districts of the state is discussed, and the statistics are summarized in a table.
