Forest Grove Gets 1942 Archery Meet

Forest Grove will play host to the state archery shoot next year and the dates were set as July 3, 4, and 5. Selection of the next host city and nomination of officers were made at the annual business meeting and banquet of the association held Saturday evening. Ted Hunter of Sheridan was chosen president; LeRoy Smith of Forest Grove, first vice president; Forest Lemley of Cottage Grove, second vice president; J. E. Halseth of Heppner, third vice president; V. D. McCauley of Corvallis, secretary-treasurer.

DeWitt Hoot Hawkins of Portland, in the closing day Sunday captured the York round and the all around championship of the 15th annual event of the state association, which closed a three-day meet here Sunday. Hawkins' total score was 2076 against a score of 2031 made by Pat Chambers of Portland Saturday. Mrs. June Halseth of Heppner won the women's title with a score of 1416 as against 1366 for her nearest competitor, Mrs. Pat Chambers of Portland. Bob Dixon of Forest Grove won the crown for the junior boys with a score of 1568 and Muriel Reichart of Corvallis topped the junior girls' crown.

Of interest also was the display of yew wood bows made by A. E. Salle of Dorena, who awarded several pieces of this famous wood to the participants in the tourney, made a large display of the wood at Graber-Gettys Hardware store and arranged to have a display at the national meeting in Portland. Mr. Salle donated a \$25.00 stave to Mrs. Jack Halseth of Heppner. Homer Prowley of Portland was given his choice of a \$25.00 billet or stave for breaking the flight record and Gene Vinyard also of Portland was given a choice from 1,000 pieces of staves for breaking the state flight record.

According to Mr. Salle a fact not generally known is that eighty percent of the yew wood is grown in this section. Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Summary of Progress Flood Control Dams

(Delayed)

Cottage Grove Dam.

The construction of the Cottage Grove dam has been put on a three-shift per day basis on all features of the work. Concrete placing reaches 600 cubic yards per day, with 28,949 cubic yards now in place. There remain some 30,000 cubic yards yet to be placed to bring the spillway structure to completion. The large hydraulically operated outlet gates were embedded in concrete last week and the entire structure is rapidly taking shape.

Earth moving for the embankment section is progressing rapidly. The arrival of additional earth moving equipment is expected daily.

Construction on the relocated county roads around the reservoir has been confined to the bridges and culverts and actual grading and surfacing will begin in the very near future.

The clearing of the reservoir is practically complete except for the burning.

Dorena Reservoir.

Construction work on the relocated highways and the railroad around the proposed Dorena reservoir will be started soon.

Fern Ridge.

July 1st finds the spillway section of this dam virtually completed. There remains only some final painting and adjustment of operating equipment to be done. A total of 10,684 cubic yards of concrete was used in this item, with 799,111 pounds of steel reinforcement bars and many tons of structural steel.

Excavation and embankment have been resumed, after the winter shut down, on a three-shift per day basis. About 4,000 cubic yards a day are being moved at this time. Approximately 130,000 cubic yards additional material will complete the embankment section. 26,500 cubic yards of rip-rap revetment have been placed upon the embankment and on the outlet channel side slopes to prevent scour by flood waters. 40,000 cubic yards additional revetment rock will adorn the upstream face of the earth section to complete its protection.

Clearing of the reservoir has been resumed with a small crew of men. Some 600 acres yet remain to be cleared of the 4,000 that were covered with brush and timber.

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GOOD VALUES

Postal Receipts Show Gains Over Last Year

Receipts of the local post office continue to show a substantial gain according to the quarterly report recently compiled by N. J. Nelson, postmaster. The quarter ending June 30th showed the largest gain of any period in the present year. Receipts for the quarter ending June 30, 1941, were \$5,499.51, a gain of \$968.54 over the corresponding period of last year or 21.20 percent. The increase in receipts ending June 30, 1940, were 5.4 percent over the 1939 period.

Receipts for the past month totaled \$1,918.71 against \$1,381.07 for June of 1940, a gain of 31 percent.
