## Six Visiting Princesses Will Be Entertained at Eugene July 24-26

EUGENE, July 13th (Special)—Six visiting princesses from nearby Oregon towns will supplement Eugene's royal court during the Oregon Trail Pageant celebration here, July 24, 25 and 26, according to word from pageant officials.

Queen Bohemia of Cottage Grove, Queen Ruth of the Lebanon Strawberry Festival, Queen Alice of the Junction City Lamb show, and Queen Oakridge already have signified their intentions of being on hand for the famed three-day epic of the west, with two other royal ladies to be selected to complete the court of Queen Susannah V and her five attending Belles.

The entire city of Eugene is "dressed-up" to meet the royal party and usher in the pageant, with all streets being decorated with colorful flags and bunting, and store fronts being transformed into replicas of pioneer business establishments.

Every Eugene man now boasts a beard of some sort, and Eugene ladies and lassies go to work, bridge parties or wherever they go clad in the hoop skirts and pet bonnets which their grandmothers wore.

The pageant spectacle to be presented nightly at the Fairgrounds is rapidly emerging as a finished and magnificent performance, with 3,000 participants being coached daily by Doris Smith, co-director of the pageant.

The huge 600 foot stage has been completed, and rehearsals on it are being held. The massive set has a central 250 foot platform on which is an actual waterfall, down which a rider will plunge with his waring horse.

The stage, prepared by Horace Robinson, co-director, features snow-clad mountain peaks, green fir trees, winding trails framed between two log blockhouses, and two other stages besides the 250-foot central platform.

### IT'S TIME FOR A PICNIC.

#### Picnic Spaghetti.

2 1-lb. packages spaghetti  
2 lbs. ground steak  
1 lb. cheese  
2 onions, chopped  
1 No. 2 can corn  
1 can medium olives  
3 cans tomato sauce  
Salt and pepper

Break the spaghetti into boiling water and cook until done. Drain and rinse under cold water. Brown the ground steak and onions, and add to the cooked spaghetti. Put into deep casserole or roaster in layers with the canned corn, the chopped olives, tomato sauce and seasonings. Crumble the cheese and spread on top. Bake for one hour in moderate oven. When done, remove from oven, cover tightly, and wrap in several thickness of newspaper before packing into the picnic basket. It will keep hot for several hours.
