Under the Oregon Game Code, a nonresident is defined as a person who has not lived within the confines of the state for a period of six months immediately pre-

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ceding his application for a fishing or hunting license.

Many men in the service have been under the impression that they could legally fish or hunt without a license or with a resident license before a six month's residence in the state, but the Oregon state game commission has no power to issue any special licenses for service men. If a man wishes to fish or hunt before he has lived in the state for six months, a nonresident license would be necessary.

For the benefit of persons who desire to fish for a limited time, a 10-day fishing license for non-residents is sold for \$3.
