

Turkey Output Is On the Increase

Uncle Sam is rapidly developing a turkey appetite, according to the 1940 census.

Annual turkey production was shown to have increased more than 66 per cent—from less than 17 million ten years ago to nearly 28 million—according to the last census. Biggest increases occurred in the northern and Pacific coast states where the number raised was almost two and one-half times that of ten years earlier. Some of the states badly injured by drought showed tremendous turkey production increases for two reasons—the dry weather was conducive to efficient production, and grasshoppers, which moved in on drought areas, proved prime turkey feed.

Two-thirds of all the turkeys are grown in the following states in order of volume: Texas, 3,443,951; California, 2,593,406; Minnesota, 2,508,830; Oregon, 1,677,851; Iowa, 1,436,256; Oklahoma, 1,417,586; North Dakota, 1,408,652; Missouri, 1,277,433; Kansas, 1,190,633; and South Dakota, 1,120,206.

Politics Warming Up Throughout State

Politics over the state is warming up a wee bit, although this being a non-election year, politics may not pass the discussion stage until nearer the date of election in many localities.

According to the Sunday Oregonian, Secretary of State Earl Snell is definitely in the running as a republican candidate for governor, although he has not made a formal announcement yet. Two possibilities might deter the formal announcement. One is that Senator Chas. McNary will not be a candidate to succeed himself. The other is that Walter M. Pierce of LaGrande will not run again as a candidate for representative. Chas. Sprague is expected to be a candidate for the second term as governor and the prospective fight will be the hottest seen in the republican ranks in a number of years unless all signs fail. It will even eclipse the Martin-Hess fight of two years ago, in all probability.

The outstanding democratic candidate for the governorship to date is Howard Latourette, democratic national committeeman from Oregon. He may find opposition in State Senator Lew Wallace, who will hold over his legislative berth. Wallace has denied that he will be a candidate for secretary of state.

Robert S. Farrell Jr., speaker of the Oregon house of representatives, is said to be actively campaigning for the nomination of secretary of state.

A. L. Brown, Multnomah county auditor who opposed Leslie M. Scott for state treasurer in the last election, and Rex Putnam of Salem, state superintendent of public instruction, are leading democratic contenders for the secretary of state job.
