## Blackberry Cobbler.

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- ¼ cup shortening
- ¾ cup milk (about)
- 1 pint fresh blackberries, sliced
- ¾ cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon butter

Sift flour with baking powder, salt, and sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture is as fine as meal. Add milk, mixing to a soft dough.

Roll dough into a rectangle about ¼-inch thick. Spread with berries to within ½-inch of edge. Sprinkle sugar over berries. Dot with butter. Roll like a jelly roll and seal. Place in oblong baking dish. Brush roll with milk and sprinkle with sugar. Bake in hot oven (425 deg. F.) 30 minutes. Serve with cream. Serves 8.
