

### Hillsboro Chosen For Legion Junior Baseball Tourney

With the city of Hillsboro designated at the last minute as site for the American Legion Junior state baseball tournament on Saturday and Sunday, August 9 and 10, plans for the two-day sports event are being pushed ahead at break-neck speed under guidance of Ed L. Moore, general chairman, and local committees.

Of first importance as planning machinery went into prompt action was an announcement by a committee in charge of grandstand facilities that a cover will be built over the Legion field seats this year to provide shade and eliminate sun-glare.

Further insuring that spectators will suffer no discomforts from torrid temperatures, Legion officials have declared it is their sincere intention if the weather is exceptionally warm to develop an air-conditioning system by hauling in some seven or eight tons of ice to place under the grandstand with strong fans forcing circulation.

Other committees in charge of planning the various phases of preparation for the state ball finals are going to equal lengths to insure a pleasant two-day adventure in the tournament city for visiting players, coaches and Legion officials as well as for the thousands of fans who will come from all parts of the state.

Ample and comfortable housing accommodations are being arranged for all visiting Junior Legion baseball players and adequate hotel facilities will be found by others who come for the two days. Expense of housing and feeding the junior ball players at Hillsboro plus a percentage of transportation expense to and from the host city will be paid from gate receipts of the tourney.

Plans are being laid for a baseball banquet honoring the players, coaches and Legion officials. Two Hillsboro theaters are offering free admission to the visiting baseballists.

A free baseball entertainment program at Shute park, located across the highway from the Legion ball park, is being considered as a possible added feature of the program on Sunday, August 10. The entertainment would be open to the public.

Replies are being received, meanwhile, to a flood of telegrams recently wired inviting American, National and Pacific Coast league officials to attend the series. Among the first to express thanks for the invitation was Kenesaw Mountain (Judge) Landis, America's dean of baseball. Other big league officials have promised to send scouts and all are wishing success to the series.

Each day of the state tournament will see all four finalist teams in action, making two double-header programs. The state tourney entrants, champions in their respective districts, will represent the city of Portland, the Willamette Valley section, Southern Oregon and Eastern Oregon.

### APPLE AND PEAR SPRAY.

Apple and pear growers in the Willamette Valley should apply the third cover spray now for the control of codling moth, according to word received from B. G. Thompson, associate entomologist, Oregon State college, by O. S. Fletcher, county agent and Herold V. Loughead, county horticulture inspector.

The second-brood moths are now active, and are depositing eggs. These eggs under ordinary conditions will hatch by August 6. Sprays should be applied before that date.

The recommended spray is lead arsenate, 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water.

### Crimson Clover Is Added to Program To Purchase Seed

Addition of crimson clover to the 1941 Seed Purchase Program of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration was announced Friday by Raymond A. Johnson, chairman of the Lane County AAA committee. Prices range from 8½ to 7½ cents a pound, depending upon the grade.

Oregon grown seed produced in 1941 will be purchased from eligible growers, on the following schedule.

Germination 90 per cent, 8½ cents a pound; germination 85 per cent, 8 cents; germination 80 per cent, 7½ cents a pound. All seed must be 96 per cent pure, contain no noxious weed seed, less than one per cent common weeds, and not more than one-half of one per cent other crop seeds.

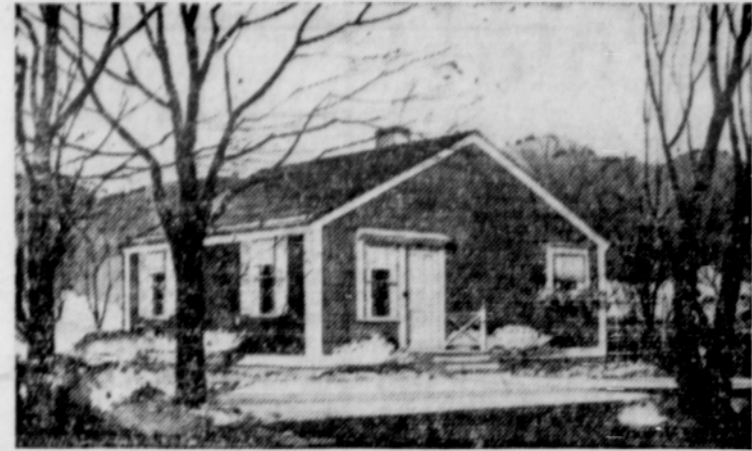
Besides crimson clover, AAA's

1941 Seed Purchase Program now includes Austrian field peas, hairy vetch, Willamette vetch, common vetch and Italian ryegrass. Seed purchase is distributed to southern cotton farmers for use as cover crops through the AAA Conservation materials program.
