AUG. 30 DEADLINE FOR 1942 CROP INSURANCE.

With August 30 as the final date for taking out crop insurance in fall wheat, the state AAA office is staging a campaign throughout the state to acquaint all wheat growers with provisions of the new simplified crop insurance program.

Three major improvements in the 1942 program are being called to growers' attention. They are as follows:

1. Provision for payment of premium with a non-interest-bearing note signed at the time of application. The note may be paid by the grower any time before August 18, 1942. After that date it will be deducted from his AAA conservation payment or wheat loan.
2. A single application form, executed by one signature, which insures all of the farmer's interest in the wheat crop.
3. Revision of premium rates by inclusion of recent crop history on the individual farm.

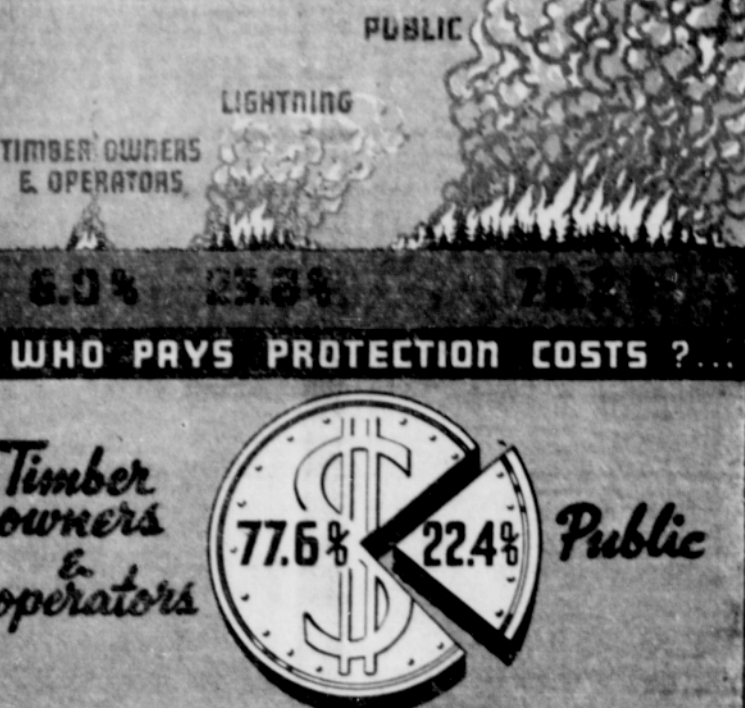

Timely Recipes

Peach Tarts.

Cover bottom of individual pie shells with sweetened peach slices and fill with ice cream. Top with meringue, taking care to cover ice cream completely; brown quickly in a hot oven, 450 degrees. Serve at once.

Peach Ice Cream.

1 cup powdered sugar
¼ tsp salt
1 cup top milk
1 tsp gelatin
¼ cup cold water
2 cups fresh peach pulp
1 cup whipping cream
¼ tsp almond extract

Soak the gelatin in cold water for five minutes. Dissolve the gelatin over hot water and add the milk, a teaspoonful at a time. Add the sugar, salt and the peach pulp. Stir well and fold in the stiffly beaten whipping cream and flavoring. Pour into a refrigerator tray and freeze. Stir every twenty minutes until the mixture is firm.

MARKET QUOTAS PROPOSED FOR IRISH POTATO CROPS.

Oregon potato growers are being asked to give their views on legislation pending in congress which would establish marketing quotas on potatoes, the state AAA office has announced. Meetings are being held in the principal potato-producing areas, and in other counties county AAA offices are contacting growers to acquaint them with provisions of the proposed legislation.

The measure was drafted at a conference of growers in Washington in June, and later revised in accordance with suggestions from growers in several states. The revised draft, introduced in the House by Congressman Bonner, would apply the same principle to potatoes now used with wheat, for growers of more than three acres.

The bill provides for proclamation of quotas by the secretary of agriculture not later than September 15 of each year, subject to approval by the growers at a referendum not later than September 30. If carried by a two-thirds majority, quotas would be in effect for the crop harvested in the succeeding calendar year.

10,000 LOSE JOBS.

NEW YORK — About 10,000 New Yorkers and 150,000 men throughout eastern states are faced with loss of their jobs as a result of night closings, from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m., of gasoline stations, Louis Kimmel, business manager of the gasoline merchants of Brooklyn and Queens, estimated Thursday.

A spokesman for the gasoline station, parking attendants division of the Teamsters Union, AFL, with 4,000 members, agreed with Kimmel that 10,000 men in the city, averaging \$25 a week pay, would lose their jobs through night closings.
