Livestock Market

The livestock market at Portland Union Stock Yards opened this week with steady to higher prices showing in all divisions.

The cattle market was about steady Tuesday but some branches of the trade went without a test. A few light grass steers sold at \$9.75 to 10.25, with common grades down to \$8.25. Good light fed steers were quoted to Monday's top of \$12.50, although nothing of that caliber was available. Grass fat heifers made \$8.50 to 9.50, with light dairy heifers around \$7.00 to 7.75. Canner and cutter cows brought \$5.00 to 6.00, with fat dairy cows up to \$6.25 and 6.50. A few beef cows sold at \$7.00 to 7.65, with good young cows up to \$8.25. Common to medium bulls went at \$7.50 to 8.50, with good sausage offerings at \$9.00 to 9.50. Good to choice vealers were steady at \$12.00 to 13.00, with common to medium grades around \$8.00 to 11.00.

The hog supply was comparatively larger Tuesday and prices dropped about 25c from Monday's high time. Good to choice grades weighing around 175 to 215 lbs. sold from \$12.50 to 12.75. Medium grades went down to \$12.25. Weights from 225 to 260 lbs. were mostly at \$11.75 to 12.00 with a few up to \$12.25. Light lights were rather scarce but a few desirable lots sold at \$11.50 to 11.75. Packing sows shared in the weakness, selling mainly at \$9.75 to 10.25, with smooth lightweights up to \$10.50 and above, while heavies ranged down to \$9.50. Feeder pigs were scarce but good to choice grades were considered salable around \$12.00.

The sheep trade was less active but prices were about steady, quality considered. More of the lambs arrived in an unfinished condition with strictly finished kinds rather scarce. A six deck string of feeders which were bought to arrive enlarged the receipts. Most of the good to choice springers sold at \$9.50 to 9.75 with medium to good grades at \$8.75 to 9.25. Very good lambs ranged down to \$7.50 or below. Several lots of good feeder lambs cashed at \$8.25 to 8.50. Odd yearlings sold at \$6.00. Good fat ewes made \$3.75 to 4.50 with common ewes down to \$2.50.

Good beef cows \$7.50 to 8.25; medium 7.00 to 7.50, common \$6.00 to 6.50, canners \$4.75 to 5.50. Bulls, medium to good \$8.50 to 9.50, common \$7.25 to 8.00. Vealers, good to choice \$12.00 to 13.00.

HOGS: Good to choice carlots \$13.00; 170 to 215 lb. truckins \$12.50 to 12.75; 230 to 285 lb. butchers \$11.75 to 12.00; lightweight butchers \$11.50 to 11.75; packing sows \$9.75 to 10.25; feeder pigs \$12.00 to 12.40.

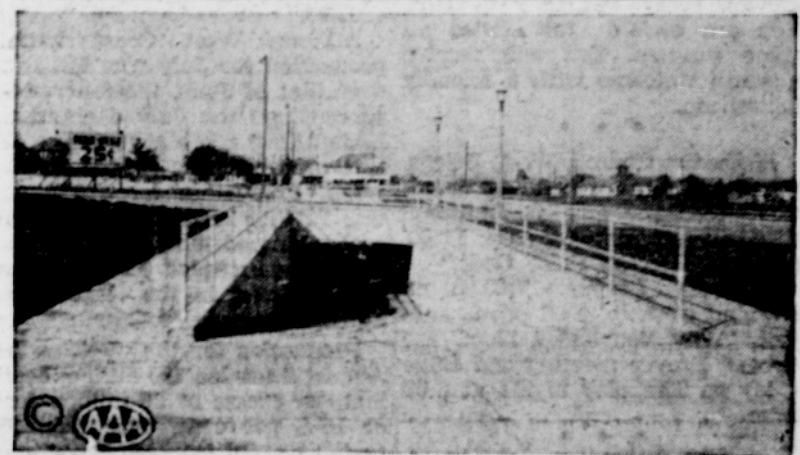

TRY THIS ON YOUR CAMERA—In getting a close-up photograph of the world's oldest living thing, the General Sherman tree in Sequoia National Park, ingenious Mike Roberts, photographer of Oakland, brought along a forty-foot tower. He set it up, climbed on top and shot a full length picture of the 274-foot high Sequoia Gigantea. This extraordinary direct-color photograph is included in the Standard Oil Company of California 1941 collection of scenic views. The pictures in this collection, depicting scenes along highways of the West, are being distributed by Standard Service Men throughout the West. The distribution is being handled through ninety-one zones on a rotating schedule with the release of a new photographic print every two weeks. Under this plan a motorist may collect several different pictures in a normal day's driving and a sizable collection on longer trips.
