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13 New Teachers To Greet Pupils On September 8

Five New Teachers for Grade and Six for High School

ALL SCHOOL BUILDINGS COMPLETELY RENOVATED

Thirteen new teachers of a total staff of thirty-five will greet public school pupils in Cottage Grove when school opens here Monday, September 8. Five of the new teachers will be in the grade school and six at the high school; and two are band and vocal music supervisors, working in both grade and high school.

Wednesday and Thursday of next week, September 3 and 4, will be registration day at the union high school. Freshmen are to register Wednesday morning from 9:30 to 12:00; sophomores, Wednesday afternoon from 1:30 to 4:00. Juniors Thursday morning from 9:30 to 12:00; seniors, Thursday afternoon from 1:30 to 4:00. F. L. Grannis, principal of the high school, urges that every student appear for this registration as a full day of school will be held on Monday, the opening day.

All school buildings of the city have been completely renovated during the summer months and are in excellent condition for the beginning of the year's work. Additional playground equipment is being installed on the elementary school grounds, including a merry-go-round, horizontal ladder, and a new type giant stride. Woodwork in the rooms of the Adams building has been newly painted. A variety of colors have been used which greatly adds to the attractiveness of the rooms. Cupboards and lockers have been built in several of the classrooms.

Several new courses will be offered in the high school. Spanish will be taught for the first time, taking the place of French. This subject will be open to freshmen, sophomores, and juniors; and according to state regulations must be pursued for two years. Elementary Business Science will take the place of Commercial Geography and Commercial Arithmetic, and will include much of the material offered in these courses together with general business problems. It is an integrated course preparatory to further commercial studies open to freshmen and sophomores. Advanced Business Science, a new upper class subject will include the fundamentals of bookkeeping, salesmanship, and commercial law with an opportunity for each student to specialize in the phase of business training most desired. The subject of physics is offered this year to juniors and seniors, and world cultures to sophomores and juniors. A general course in choral singing will be available for students interested in music.

The list of new teachers who will be introduced to parents and pupils follows:

Miss LoDene Jackson, a graduate of the Colorado State College of Education with special work at the University of Oregon, will be the new vocal music supervisor, taking the place of Miss Marian (Continued on back page)

Rains Aid Crops; Damage Beans

Recent rains, which, according to the weather prophets, were supposed to have stopped after a day or so have given the bean growers a headache, but to local farmers and woodsmen and lumbermen, they have been a blessing. Over a half an inch of rain had fallen here since Monday up to yesterday morning. There has been moisture enough to start early fall plowing and some farmers plan to start sowing small grain and cover crops.

Moisture has also been beneficial to nut crops and to late fruits, what is left to gather. To the bean grower the rain has been a source of worry, since the grower has been caught short of help with a big harvest. Had fair weather prevailed for a few more days bean picking would have been finished. Amount of damage to the beans has not been learned.

Grove Gunners Win 2nd in Shoot At Eugene Sunday

Local Gunmen Also Win County Shoot for Another Year.

The Cottage Grove gunners placed second in the Lane county championship trap shoot held at Eugene Sunday, competing against four other clubs of the county. Despite the rain the shoot was declared a big success. Five shooters from Eugene took top honors with a score of 484 out of a possible 500 or two birds better than the score that won the state championship. The local team, which took eighth place in the state meet, won second place Sunday with the score of 452 and the right to hold the county shoot next year.

Local shooters were paced by Harry Rente with a score of 95. Other scores were: Howard Harpole, 90; W. M. Harpole, 89; N. J. Nelson, 91; M. O. Wicks, 87.

Ray Glass of Eugene won individual honors with a 99 at the 16-yard line and 94 on the handicap. Scores of other teams were: Florence 449, Noti 444, Springfield 443.

Many Students Plan to Attend Universities Soon

In spite of the demands that national defense are making upon Oregon youth, to date, over 900 new students and transfers have indicated their intention to attend the University of Oregon this fall.

Almost every state of the union and the territories of Alaska and Hawaii will be represented in this group which will register for classes on September 26 and 27.

Antelope Tags Still Available

While hunters are purchasing more antelope tags this year than has been the case in any year since open seasons on this fleet footed animal were established, there are still tags available for hunters who desire them, according to announcement by the Oregon State Game Commission.

This year there are two antelope seasons; the first, in that part of Malheur county south of the Burns-Ontario highway from September 22 to October 5, both dates inclusive. The second antelope season will be held in parts of Lake and Harney counties from September 28 to October 5, both dates inclusive.

The bag limit is one antelope of either sex, and tags cost \$1 each for resident or nonresident hunters. This fee is in addition to the regular hunting license fee.

20,000 Soldiers Going Through; 14,000 to Stop Here 3 Nights

Twenty thousand soldiers will be going through Cottage Grove the next few days, 14,000 will be bivouaced here for three nights beginning tonight. The soldiers are returning to Fort Ord, California, from the 4th army maneuvers near Fort Lewis, Washington. Major T. C. Edwards was here yesterday completing the arrangements for the stop. The next stop south is Crescent City, California.

Camp for the soldiers will be established at the old airport south of town and near the Shell bulk station on 4th street. The 14,000 stopping will be divided about equal for each of the three nights beginning tonight.

Berlin Claims 22nd Red Army Is Annihilated

Vital Town at Mouth of the Dnieper River Said Taken

FRENCH EX-PREMIER IS WOUNDED

In sensational new victory claims, the German high command yesterday at Berlin announced the capture of the vital, heavily defended town of Berislav, at the mouth of the Dnieper river, and a complete annihilation of the 22nd Red army on the Central front with 70,000 Soviet troops killed or captured.

A Budapest report, relayed over the official German radio, said that some forces of Axis troops already had succeeded in crossing the Dnieper river following failure of a concerted Red counter-attack.

On every front—in the air, on land and even in Russia's rivers—the high command claimed vast new destruction had been wrought to the Russian war machine.

At least 95 Russian planes were said to have been shot down during furious aerial battles on Tuesday as the Luftwaffe continued to strike at railroads and river transports. Rail lines in the Leningrad sector, the communique said, were the most heavily bombed targets.

At least 15 Soviet gunboats, placed in the Dnieper river to blast Nazi forces on the western banks, were reported sunk by the German artillery and machine-gun fire. Others were sent to the bottom in severe Luftwaffe attacks.

Laval Wounded

Pierre Laval, deposed vice premier of the Vichy French government and foremost advocate of complete cooperation with Germany, was shot and wounded at German-occupied Versailles yesterday in a bold assassination attempt by a young French Communist who had enlisted in an "anti-Bolshevik" brigade recruited to fight Russia.

The swarthy 58-year-old storm-center of French politics, who twice had served as premier of Republican France and is a veteran of many cabinets, was hit by two bullets—one in the head and the other in the right side of the lower chest, but his wounds were declared to be "slight."

Booster Club Will Insure High School Athletes Against Hurt

The Booster's club has arranged to take out insurance on all local high school athletes according to Buck Cagle. Policies will be written on high school football players which will give the player remuneration in the form of hospitalization and medical fees in the event of injury on the field or while being transported to and from the field. At the conclusion of the football season the policies will be transferred to the basketball players and at the end of the basketball season to the high school baseball players.

Cottage Grove is the only place in the state outside of Portland to provide such protection to high school athletes.

CARS COLLIDE, NONE HURT.

Two cars driven by Leonard McDonald and Chas. Alderman collided at 5th and Adams last Thursday and one car was turned over on a lawn but fortunately no one was hurt. One car was said to have been practically demolished.

Elbert Bede May Be Republican Candidate for Secretary of State

Elbert Bede of Portland, publisher of the Masonic Analyst and former editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, may be a candidate for the office of secretary of state according to an article in the Oregon Journal of August 17 by Ralph Watson. Bede, says Watson, was almost persuaded to enter the race eight years ago against Earl Snell, but stepped aside in favor of a fellow publisher, Carl Abrams who opposed Snell. Dorena Farmer Is Found Shot to Death Saturday

Rites Held Monday Afternoon at Mills Chapel.

Fred Kelly, 47, prominent farmer of the Kelly district, five miles out on the Row river was found shot to death at 7:30 Saturday morning near the wagon shed of his farm home. A twenty gauge shotgun was found lying near the body.

Mr. Kelly, a native of this section, was born and reared in the Kelly district and had lived in the Kelly district practically all of his life. The Kelly farm was under the Dorena reservoir and Mr. Kelly had sold the farm land to the government and bought property on Knox hill just east of town and was building a new home there when he died.

Services were held from the Mills chapel Monday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. with the Rev. Gordon Hynes, officiating. Interment was made in the I. O. O. F. Masonic cemetery. Surviving are his widow, Nona Jane; two sons, Alta and Harvey Kelly, both of Cottage Grove; three brothers, Frank, William and Warren Kelly, all of the Kelly district and two sisters, Mrs. Fred Jones of Marcola and Mrs. John Hastings, of Cottage Grove.

Plenty Antimony In Bohemia Mine

There's plenty of antimony for national defense needs in the mines at Bohemia, but smelting and transportation costs have made the mining of this metal commercially unprofitable to date according to testimony given at the metals hearing at Grants Pass last week before Senator Holman. Bill Patten, owner of a mine in the Bohemias producing antimony, zinc, copper and one or two other metals, testified before the committee that his mine was prolific in antimony, which is used in making steel. And the testimony of Mr. Patten regarding the possibilities at Bohemia is backed by state geologists, who say that the Patten mine at Bohemia is the best antimony mine in the state.

A smelter for this section of the state is needed if development of the various metals proceeds at a normal rate. Road facilities, transportation charges and the methods of operation adopted by the smelters have all conspired to hold back development in this section. In fact according to testimony of engineers the smelters penalize the mine owner for other metals found in the ore, which adds to the expense.

Many to File Tax Returns March 15

WASHINGTON-- Approximately 23,650,000 individuals will make out income tax returns next year by March 15 under a tentative agreement made by the Senate finance committee Friday to lower personal exemptions for married persons from \$2,000 to \$1,500, and for single persons from \$800 to \$750.

Treasury officials estimated about 16,000,000, a record breaking number, will pay taxes as a result of the move to broaden the income tax base. Exemptions will exclude the remainder, but they will be compelled to file income tax returns, nevertheless.

While the proposal will have little effect on small wage earners, it will shove persons with middle and upper bracket incomes into higher surtax brackets, said Chairman George (D) Ga.
