New Firms Given Experience Rating

Slightly more penalty rates than reduced rates are being given to firms affected by the new experience ratings, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission announced recently. The new rates are on payrolls for the last half of the year, payable quarterly in October, 1941 and January, 1942.

Of the 6,084 which had the necessary three full years' employment experience to qualify for rates, 1,857 received the normal 2.7 per cent, 2,198 received higher rates and 2,029 lower rates. Because of adjustments of charges against many employer accounts, the final figures may vary slightly.

With the trust fund expected to reach the \$14,400,000 "ceiling" before December 31, employers who received penalty rates anticipate their contributions on 1942 payrolls will be at the normal 2.7 per cent. The fund now is over \$13,900,000, but is not expected to hit the "ceiling" until third quarter payments start in October.

A recent analysis of the ratings shows an unexpected 70 firms receiving the lowest rate of 1 per cent. With a reserve ratio of 12 per cent of the average annual payroll necessary to reach this rate, most firms which were subject to the unemployment tax from its start in 1936 to the end of 1940 could build up a reserve of only 10.8 per cent—even where no benefits were charged against them. Only one of the 70 firms had a payroll over \$50,000.

Other firms securing reduced rates included 615 at 1.5 per cent, and 1,344 at 2 per cent. Those who were given penalty rates include 567 at 3 per cent, 422 at 3.5 per cent and 1,209 at 4 per cent. Of those getting lower rates, 53.2 per cent had payrolls over \$10,000 a year, while of those getting higher rates only 37.4 had the higher payrolls. Of the 23 firms with million-dollar payrolls, 12 received lower rates and 3 higher rates.

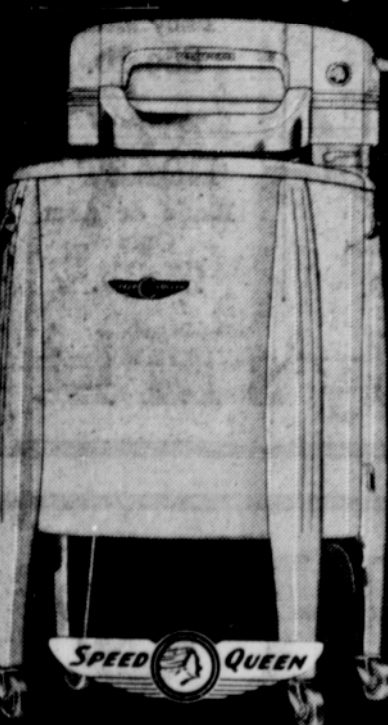
