As Echoed From Cottage Grove Union High School

School opened Monday, September 8, with an assembly of students, presided over by president of the student body, Harold Bauder. Superintendent Ferrin introduced the faculty for the coming year, including eight new members. Principal Grannis gave up-to-the-minute instructions on registration and urged care of building. The assembly opened with the singing of "America" by Miss Jackson, new vocal instructor, and closed with "God Bless America." The pledge of allegiance and flag salute were given after the singing of "America."

Homemaking Class Activities.

The Homemaking III class is planning a play school for the next two weeks. This will start Monday, September 22.

The Homemaking II are studying preservation of foods and will be merry little girls in aprons next week when they start canning various foods.

The Homemaking I class is studying food requirements for the body. They plan to start to cook Friday. The next week will be spent in planning and preparing dishes to be served for an evening meal.

The high school cafeteria opened the first day of school under the management of Miss Jean Ingles. Salads, hot dishes, milk shakes, ice cream bars, may be obtained for five cents each. Milk is sold for three cents a bottle.

Student Activities.

Students can now buy student body tickets for \$1.00 each semester or \$2.00 a year. The ticket covers student body dues as well as admission to activities. These tickets are good for all home games and the Newsette. The benefits acquired by this ticket are: Football, 5 games at 25c, \$1.25; basketball, 8 games at 15c, \$1.20; baseball, 3 games at 15c, 45c; and Newsette, 32 editions at 3c, 96c; the total cost, \$3.86. The actual cost of the benefits are \$3.86 but by buying a \$2.00 activities ticket \$1.86 of actual money is saved.

Music Activities.

Choral singing and the boys' and girls' glee clubs will make up the vocal part of the music curriculum in the high school this year, under the supervision of Miss LoDene Jackson. The choral singing group which consists of 16 members take the course to learn to appreciate music and become familiar with the auditory theory of music.

The boys' glee club consisting of 15 members, will spend the year singing folk songs, negro spirituals and modern songs while the 125 members of the girls' glee club will sing sacred music and secular old and modern songs. The two glee clubs will combine some time before Christmas to produce a colorful operetta entitled "Tulip Time," which has its setting in Holland.

The band, under direction of Mr. Hebard, totals 20 members.

School Building Improvements. During the summer vacation there were many fine improvements made in and around the new school building.

Some of the improvements are a sprinkling system installed south of the building; a new gas lawnmower. The senior classes of 1938, '39 and '40 donated money to the student body which was used to purchase a new electric clock which hangs in the hall facing the main entrance to the building; last year's senior class contributed money which will be used in purchasing new band instruments.

Latin Club Elects.

The Latin club carrying over from last year organized and elected officers Monday: President, Virginia Andrews; vice president, Alden Garoutte; secretary and treasurer, Virginia Brown. Members of the project chairman are: Billie Ann Butler, chairman; Betty Graham and Shirley Culver. The club period will be held during class period on Monday of each week.

School handbooks, put out for the second year, were issued to all freshmen and students who bought student body tickets. The hand-

books are issued for the purpose of answering questions that may arise in the minds of the students. The books are snappy looking this year in bright gold covers. Freshmen receive these books for the asking, upperclassmen have to pay 10c per book.

A new game which has been purchased lately for the girls' physical education classes is tennis. It is played with the same rules as volley ball, only it is played with hard rubber rings, which must be caught and returned with one hand.

Maintenance and repair of the equipment used by the British military forces are the principal duties expected from the applicants, who will be paid from \$24.12 to \$38.65 a week, plus room and board, transportation, clothing and medical care. Enlistment is for the duration of the war up to three years.

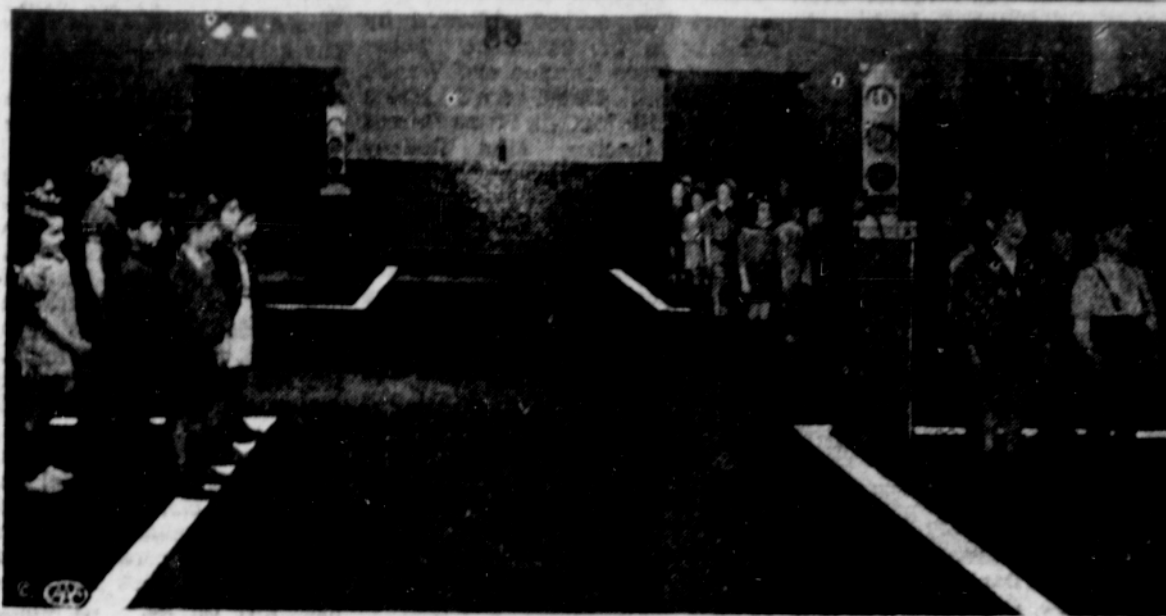
Besides having technical experience and training, applicants must be from 18 to 40 or 50 years, depending on the position. Radio, automobile and electrical qualifications are stressed.

New Nash to Be Shown Here Soon

DETROIT, MICHIGAN. — Harvesting the fruit of a long-term planning program, which provided Nash with new production lines, machines and dies before the national defense emergency set in, Nash Motors Division of Nash-Kelvinator Corporation this week presented fifteen new 1942 models. They are in three series of five models each and include the low-priced Nash Ambassador '600,' the medium-priced Nash Ambassador Six and the Nash Ambassador Eight.

"Four years ago," W. A. Bles, general sales manager, said, "Nash began preparing to build a new and advanced automobile to enter a car in the Ford, Chevrolet and Plymouth mass market. Millions were invested in new machines, new and advanced production lines, and new tools. This most complete modernization of an automobile plant in years was virtually completed before the national defense emergency set in, and so Nash was in a position to go ahead with its completely new cars."

The cars soon will be on display at the local Nash showroom at Golden Rule Auto Service.

Feature of the 3 series of cars Nash will build in 1942 will be the low - priced, high - economy Nash '600,' which Nash engineers claim is the newest automobile in the world in that it involves construction principles entirely new to the mass production automobile world. The new construction principles were thoroughly approved and acclaimed by thousands of drivers last year, but the car appears for 1942 with many advancements and improvements.

All the fifteen Nash models are big cars, with full three-passenger seats which are just short of five feet wide. Even the low-priced '600' is 196½ inches in over-all length, or about 16½ feet from bumper to bumper.

ANTI-PLAGUE DRIVE IS ORDERED ON RODENTS.

Prompt eradication of rodents as a safeguard against bubonic plague was advocated Monday by Doctor Frederick D. Stricker, secretary of the State Board of Health at Portland.

While no case of the plague has been reported in Oregon since 1934, infestations of animals has been discovered in Lake, Harney, Malheur, Grant and Walla Walla Counties, Stricker said.

Plague in rodents is prevalent in most states of the Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast and has appeared in San Francisco and East Bay cities of Oakland. Two cases resulting in deaths were recently reported from Siskiyou county, California, according to Stricker.
