DO YOU LIKE GRAPE JELLY?

Try this excellent recipe

For jelly making, concord grapes are best. All blue grapes, however, are NOT concord. Be sure you get concord when you ask for concord because other grapes take a different recipe.

Wash and crush about 1½ lbs., fully ripe grapes. Add 1½ cups water and simmer, covered 10 minutes. Squeeze out juice. For concord juice use the following proportions:

5 cups concord juice

HIGH SCHOOL PRESS CONFERENCE AT U. OF O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON—Youthful writers from all over the state will meet in Eugene Friday and Saturday, October 24 and 25, for the seventeenth annual Oregon State High School Press Association conference. The University of Oregon journalism school is sponsoring the affair.

The conference will open Friday with round-table discussions of specialized phases during the afternoon and a get-together banquet in the evening. Mass meetings Saturday will culminate in announcement of the winners of the newspaper judging contest and with election of 1941-42 officers.

Awards are given the best papers in each classification, the publications being grouped according to size of school and facilities. Winners last year were the Lincoln Cardinal and Franklin Post of Portland; The Scroll, Grants Pass; Hi-Life, Carlton; Timberline, Vernon, and the Pandleton Lantern. Entries must be postmarked not later than midnight, October 10.

GATHERS RIPE BLACK-BERRIES.

H. D. Myers, who lives four miles west of town on the Lorane highway, Saturday brought in to the Sentinel office a cluster of wild blackberries, which he gathered from a vine on his farm. The blackberries, not the bush variety, usually ripen in June and the early part of July. 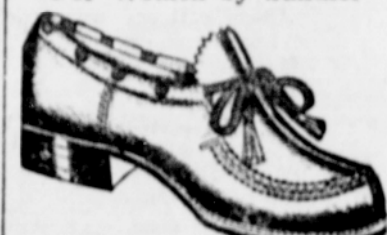
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
