

OREGON 4-H DAIRY TEAM TO MEMPHIS



TWO Benton county girls, Jane Keeney, 16, and Edith Brown, 17, of Corvallis, are Oregon's entry in the national 4-H dairy foods demonstration contest at the National Dairy Show, Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 11-18. Coached by Geraldine de Lancey, their club leader, who was the 1940 national girls' leadership champion, the team won over all rivals in the annual competition at the recent State Fair, Salem. Their demonstration emphasized that the addition of cheese to common dishes increases the color, flavor and nutritious value of food. As state winners they receive all-expense trips to Memphis through the Kraft Cheese Company, which also provides \$2800 in college scholarships for the eight highest scoring teams in the finals there.

MURPHY WARNS AGAINST UNAUTHORIZED SOLICITORS.

Claude E. Murphy of Salem, commissioner with the state real estate department, has issued a warning to all merchants and professional men of the state of a number of unlicensed solicitors who are working in the state, trying to collect accounts. Effective July 1 of this year the state law provides that anyone who solicits accounts must display a solicitor's card. All licensed collectors are required to give a \$3,000 bond, which guarantees the merchant or business man that he will get his money.
