Fire Prevention Is Stressed

Fire defense is the keynote of the 1941 Fire Prevention Week, October 5-11. Every effort must be made to prevent fires, to conserve for defense needs valuable properties that are annually lost through preventable fires. No country can afford the luxury of more than \$300,000,000 loss by fire each year. Now is a good time to go in for those safety steps, during Fire Prevention Week, when thoughtful citizens everywhere are doing their utmost to prevent fire. Fire attacks without warning and when least expected. Its destroying force takes a heavy toll of life and property. Attacks by fire can be stopped most effectively before they start. Fire can be defeated and losses greatly curtailed. During depression years, home building failed to keep pace with normal needs. Now is no time to allow thousands of homes to burn in fires that might easily have been prevented.

Every fire department has a real fire prevention job to do, every city, county, state and nation, and fire prevention week October 5-11, this year, is none too soon to enlist the whole community in this drive.

There are several outstanding ways to make this prevention week one of the best ever and most effective. A house to house canvass. Many fire departments make fire prevention week for their fall dwelling inspection campaigns. A lot can be done in the schools toward fire prevention. The children are doing lots of good taking the little ideas home with them that they have been told while studying fire prevention in school.

More than half of the deaths from fire occur in and around dwelling houses. Fire attacks so suddenly and spread so quickly that oftentimes persons are trapped on upper floors. Inspection in the homes are of the utmost importance. Following this a thorough job of cleaning out the premises should be undertaken and all fire dangers should be corrected.

Some of the leading fire hazards are: Soot loaded chimneys causing numerous fires, therefore it is important that you check your chimneys, see that there are no holes or cracks for sparks to fly out and ignite combustible materials that may be nearby, see that they are properly cleaned each year. Misuse of electricity is cause of several fires a year. Have your wiring inspected and all repairs as well as new work done by an expert electrician. You will find that it will pay. See that standard fuses of the correct size only are in use and when a fuse burns out do not bridge it with a coin or metal.

Another hazard that is sometimes neglected is oily rags and paint rags or mops. Unless these can be disposed of they should be kept in a tightly covered metal container.

Perhaps the greatest hazard of all is the careless use of matches and smoking materials, yet it is very easy to eliminate this danger. Make sure that all matches and smoking materials are out before discarding them. Do not throw them into waste paper baskets. Always keep ash trays handy to receive them. Matches should be kept beyond the reach of children, and in a container of metal. Smoking in bed is another great hazard. The misuse of gasoline, benzene, or naphtha also claims several lives each year. These can be used in safety for cleaning clothes and other garments.

6. Be sure there are no gas leaks in your home. Have the system checked regularly.
7. Do not overheat your furnace and check the chimney for leaks and sparks.
8. Teach your family the danger of fires and what to do in case of one.
9. Do away with old, defective appliances and machinery that could cause fires.
