

Defense Savings Stamps Will Be Offered by Stores

Chamber of Commerce Committee to Canvass All Local Stores

WILSON STRESSES NEED OF SUSTAINED YIELD

Plans were inaugurated at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon Tuesday to place defense saving stamps on sale at local stores and commercial concerns at an early date. Looking to the completion of details necessary for a wide distribution of these stamps, on sale in all parts of the nation, Dr. H. A. Hagen, president of the Chamber of Commerce, appointed a committee of three to work with H. E. Eakin, member of the Lane county defense bond committee. Stamp committeemen appointed include: George Machen, William Haldeman and Herman Petersen.

It is the intention of the committee to offer stamps to all business houses, the stamps can be purchased from the post office. In many places merchants are asking customers to take change in defense stamps. N. J. Nelson, post master, called attention to the fact that material for such a committee had been at the post office for some time and that there had been a demand to purchase defense stamps.

Rites Today for Mary Hemenway

Also by four grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held today at the Mills Chapel with the Rev. Gordon Hypes officiating. Interment will be in the I.O.O.F.-Masonic cemetery.

Blackout Is Scheduled for Cottage Grove and Southern Lane County

Date Falls on Halloween Night; Hour of Blackout Will Be Announced Later; Ten More Police Reserves Are Badly Needed Immediately

Cottage Grove and Southern Lane county is definitely scheduled to have a blackout on the night of October 31st, which incidentally is Halloween night. Several other cities and communities will join in a general blackout to be staged over western Oregon on this date, the hour to be set later.

Preliminaries for the coming event were discussed at a meeting of the Cottage Grove police reserves here Tuesday night according to Everett Abbott, member of the reserves. Ten more men are urgently needed for the reserves, he says. At present the reserve force consists of twenty men. Under the present setup the city of Cottage Grove is entitled to thirty men or ten reserves for each paid officer.

Battery E Gets Royal Reception

The men of Battery "E" were pleased with the royal welcome which was afforded them during their three-day homecoming celebration last Friday, Saturday and Sunday in Cottage Grove.

They left Fort Canby early Friday morning and the first cars began arriving in Cottage Grove about 12:00 o'clock. By 1:30 they were all in the armory enjoying the hot coffee and cookies which Mrs. Gladys Minor and the friends and mothers had prepared for them. The parade began promptly at 3:30, led by three members of the Battery E association, Major LaSells Stewart, Loren Schroeder and Dr. H. A. Hagen, followed by Captain Faye Stewart of this city and Captain Hewston of Albany, who is now captain of Battery E.

The captains were accompanied by their staff. These were followed by the high school band dressed in their colorful uniforms and led by snappy majorettes. Then came the rest of the men in uniform. The parade was halted on Main between Sixth and Seventh where the street had been previously cleared of cars. They presented a brief army drill. The men were loudly cheered by a large crowd which gathered to witness the parade. This was the first strictly military parade which has been held in Cottage Grove for many years.

At 7:00 p. m. the men and their friends were treated to a dutch lunch which was made possible by the generous donations of the Woodard Lumber Co., the Greenridge Lumber Co., and the Bohemia Lumber Co. The lunch was prepared by the Legion Auxiliary and served by a committee from the American Legion.

Sunday afternoon and evening the men left for Fort Canby where they were scheduled to be back on duty Monday morning.

The American Legion is planning on sponsoring the regular annual Mess Fund Dance on Christmas night. The proceeds from this dance are used for the entertainment and welfare of the men of Battery E.

One Seriously Cut In Collision on Lorane Mountain

A serious, but not a fatal collision, occurred on the Lorane mountain early Monday morning when two cars ran together. Leiland Ray, driving a Ford and going west, suffered a number of cuts about the face and neck when he was thrown through the windshield of his car by the force of the impact when hit by a car driven by Ole Sands, traveling in this direction. Sands, according to early reports, was not seriously injured, but Ray was severely cut and after being treated here was sent to a Eugene hospital where he is reported recuperating.

Louis Holliday and Robert A. Meacham, riding with Ray at the time of the accident, were also taken to the hospital suffering from cuts and bruises, but were not injured as critically as Ray, according to early reports.

The ballot boxes have been gaily decorated and are placed near the main entrance of the high school where everyone is depositing votes for their favorites. The first count is to be taken Friday.

Tickets for the carnival are each five cents and give the bearer a chance at any of the concessions at the carnival with the exception of the foods booth. Each ticket is worth 10 votes toward the queen and king. For admission two tickets plus one cent defense tax is necessary for admission, or 10c plus one cent tax.

Rapid Progress Being Made on Coast Fork Dam

With good weather rapid progress has been made on the construction of the Cottage Grove dam the past two weeks. From 8,000 to 10,000 yards of dirt is being moved daily to the earthen part of the dam with over 500,000 yards in place and about 200,000 yards to be placed on the dam before the earthen section is finished. Little or no concrete has been poured on the spillway in over a week. Part of the spillway is nearing completion with about five feet of concrete to be poured before that particular part is finished.

Both highways, the east and west highway around the lake shore are virtually completed. The west highway has been graded and graveled and the east highway has been graded and graveling is nearly completed.

Work of relocating the highway under the Dorena project is well underway with construction going on both sections of the contract. E. C. Hall Construction Co. started work on the lower end of the highway relocation project last week. The section of the relocation being constructed by McNutt Brothers has the clearing work done and some grade constructed, but the work has been hindered by early fall rains.

Commission to Hold Exams for Office Workers

New examinations for office workers applying for jobs with the State Unemployment Compensation Commission were announced Saturday by Professor William Griffith, supervisor for the Board of Examiners.

Six classifications with starting pay from \$80 to \$120 a month are listed in the announcement. The positions include junior and senior clerk-typists, junior and senior clerk-stenographers, key punch operator and junior tabulating machine operator.

Complete information and application blanks may be obtained from the 23 local offices of the state employment service or from the Portland office, 701 Spalding Building, of the Board of Examiners, where all applications must be forwarded before November 10. Examination centers will be selected from Portland, Salem, Klamath Falls, Eugene, Medford, Ontario, Bend, Pendleton and Marshfield.

Present plans are to begin a ground school with classes to cover the subjects of air traffic rules, meteorology and navigation. These classes are free and open to anyone interested.

Pheasant Season Opens October 22

At 8:00 a. m. next Wednesday morning (October 22), the three day Chinese pheasant season in Western Oregon will officially open. The other two days of the season come on Saturday and Sunday, October 25 and 26.

Inasmuch as experience has shown that artificial propagation cannot keep up with the increased demands on Chinese Pheasants, steps have been taken to promote greater natural production.

With this end in mind, the Oregon State Game Commission, under the federal Pittman-Robertson act, has set aside approximately 100,000 acres in the Willamette valley as reserves for young birds. This territory comprises only 1/27th of the entire valley area, and through such reserves the commission is making an effort to avoid closures and maintain the supply and thus perpetuate hunting for the benefit of the hunter.

The reserves are not only designed to protect a nucleus of birds until they can build up a supply and increase the number on the reserve, but also to help populate the adjoining areas. Reserves now set up will not be closed perpetually but only for a few years when they will again be open to hunters and other areas established in alternative in the same manner and like period.

The bag limit in the valley will be not more than two male birds in any one day, or more than four such birds in the entire season of three days. Counties included in the valley area include: Multnomah, Clackamas, Washington, Columbia, Yamhill, Polk, Marion, Benton, Lane and Linn counties.
