Surveys for Army Camps Continued

Survey work on four contemplated army camps in Oregon, California and Montana will continue beyond originally-scheduled dates so that sufficient data will be available if it is decided they are needed, the zone constructing quartermaster said at San Francisco Saturday.

The announcement included the statement that "so far as is known, construction of these proposed camps, in the event that all studies establish the availability of the sites, is contingent upon the expansion of the nation's armed forces."

The proposed site vicinities, suggested sizes and new dates for completion of "pre-planning" work on the part of the architect-engineers are:

Medford, Oregon, 78,000 acres, plans and specifications 95 per cent complete, October 20.

Marysville, California, 70,000 acres, 60 percent complete, November 17.

West Yellowstone, Montana, 118,000 acres, 10 percent complete, December 8.

Corvallis, Oregon, no estimated size, "about complete," October 18.
