

Columbia Valley Control Opposed By Oregon Body

The Oregon Reclamation congress is opposed to the creation of a Columbia valley authority which would remove the control from the states concerned, and is urging that consideration of authority bills be deferred until after the passing of the present national defense emergency.

Details of the action of the congress on this and many other matters are contained in a mimeographed list of resolutions adopted, and just prepared for distribution by Dr. W. L. Powers, long-time secretary of the congress and head of the soils department at Oregon State college. In recognition of Dr. Powers' long service the congress presented him with a leather travelling bag.

The resolution dealing with the Columbia authority was the most comprehensive adopted at the congress. It holds that a recognized statutory and stable authority for the Columbia river watershed can best be accomplished through the operation of the present Bonneville act, possibly with amendments.

"We deplore the centralization of power under any authority, in any person or persons not immediately responsive to the area affected," the resolution stated.

In connection with the current drive for greater production of dairy products and vegetables for processing, the Reclamation congress pointed out that this will require the installation of more individual irrigation pumping plants, and that necessary equipment will need to be given priority rating to insure its availability in time for next season's use.

More research work on stream flow inventories and ground water resources, as well as on methods of applying irrigation water without waste of soil or water resources, was also urged. The Soil Conservation service was requested to extend to legally organized irrigation and drainage districts the same kind and amount of service it renders to soil conservation districts, thus preventing unnecessary overlapping of district organizations.

Top officers of the congress were re-elected, with Frank T. Morgan, Nyssa, continuing as president.

Increasing Farm Accidents Attributed to Machine Age

Farmer Is Urged By Red Cross to Check Accident Hazards

Washington, D. C.—Mechanization of the American farm is accounting for a mounting accident fatality toll, the Red Cross pointed out in an appeal for farm owners to participate in its year-round Home and Farm Accident Prevention drive beginning the last week of October.

Of the 4,500 farm workers killed by accidents last year, approximately 28 per cent were due to carelessness and the use of faulty implements, the Red Cross said. Ill-tempered animals, vehicles, excessive heat and falls led other farm accident causes in that order.

To the farmer, the Red Cross urges a close check-up for the removal of accident hazards. Machinery, tools and other equipment should be examined periodically and kept in good repair. Tools and implements should be kept in regular places, out of the farm yard or where they may cause a serious fall. Bulls, boars and other dangerous animals should be kept in secure pens.

Approximately 50 injuries of varying degree occur for every farm accident fatality—a nationwide total



of some 225,000 for last year, the Red Cross appeal for greater safety pointed out.

To launch this year's Accident Prevention program the Red Cross again will distribute 10,000,000 home and farm "check lists." By following the suggestions urban householders can systematically check the home for accident hazards. A similar check-up is outlined for the removal of hazards on the farm.

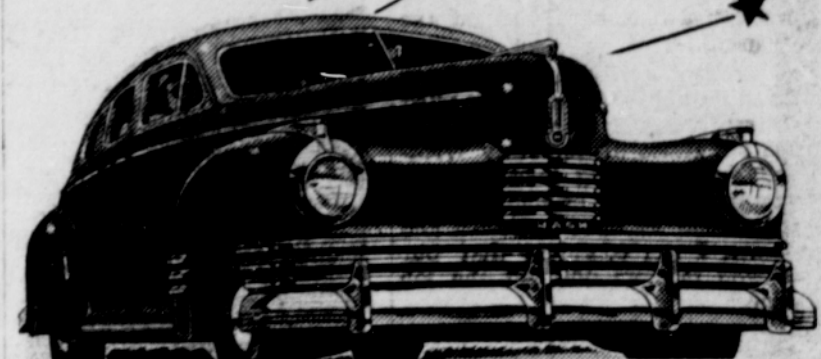
Area Under Water
