Bacon Without—

There is an easy way to do everything in this cooking business. Take the new bacon on the rind for example. It can be sliced from the rind very easily. Chill the bacon thoroughly—set it on end with the rind away from the cutter and slice down through the desired number of pieces. Always remember to slice only those pieces which are needed at the time, leaving the unused pieces attached to the rind. The reason for this? They will retain that "back to the farm" flavor and can be kept indefinitely.

Whites, Negroes Separated

There are 18 states which require the complete segregation of schools for the white and Negro races. They are Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia. In Arizona and Kansas the mandatory provision applies only to the elementary schools.

Employers May Avoid Double Assessment

Employers who failed to secure credit offsets from the federal government for payments of state unemployment taxes have another chance to avoid a double assessment, Administrator Silas Gaiser announced today. Ninety per cent of the penalty may be saved if back payments are made before November 18, 1941, according to word from Washington, D. C.

The new action by Congress affects only those employers of eight or more workers and who are subject to both federal and state unemployment contributions. While the federal government levies a 3 per cent payroll tax, the state tax of 2.7 per cent may be claimed as credit offset under Title IX of the Social Security law if payment is made during January following the affected year.

Rebates also may be secured where penalties of more than 10 per cent have been collected, officials say.

The ruling affects payments as far back as on 1936 payrolls. As this is expected to be the last extension granted, all representatives of the commission have been instructed to bring the information before delinquent concerns promptly.

To illustrate the saving possible, the administrator cited this example: An employer with a \$50,000 payroll is taxed \$1,500 by the federal government and \$1,350 by the state. If payment is made before January 31 of the following year, the credit offset of \$1,350 leaves only \$150 due the federal government. If paid before June 30, the penalty is \$135, bringing the total payment from \$1,500 up to \$1,635. After June, however, the employer becomes liable to both taxes, or \$2,850. By taking advantage of the latest Congressional action, the employer with a \$50,000 payroll saves the difference, or \$1,215 a year.

lations committee voted to hold secret hearings on a house measure to strike out the act's ban on arming merchant ships.

The republican measure to repeal the entire act was offered by Senators Styles Bridges, N. H. Warren R. Austin, Vermont, and Chan Gurney, South Dakota. Senator Kenneth McKellar, D., Tennessee, recently introduced similar legislation.
