Home Accident Deaths Highest In Five Years

Washington, D. C.—Carelessness is writing a new stanza to "Home Sweet Home."

According to the American Red Cross, home accidents last year accounted for their greatest fatality toll in five years. Some 33,000 persons lost their lives through falls, burns, poisoning and other hazards of everyday home life. Although less dramatic—consequently less apt to attract public interest—home accident fatalities ran a close second to death on the street and highway, trailing by 1,500 deaths.

With carelessness playing the leading role, more than half of home accident deaths were attributed to falls—occurring on stairs, slippery floors, insecure rugs and use of chairs and other articles of furniture as improvised stepladders. Burns and accidental poisoning followed in that order.

HORSES, MULES DO THEIR PART FOR THE ARMY.

Western stockmen—and breeders of horses and mules throughout the country—may be interested to learn that experienced buyers of the Quartermaster Corps Remount Service are arranging to purchase 3,110 horses and 140 mules between October 1 and December 15. The war department reports the program will cost some \$533,850 and will result in the procurement of valuable animals for the cavalry and field artillery, two branches of the service still dependent upon the aid of four-footed fighters.

Farm Oddities

Reported by O.S.C. Extension Service.

Hybrid popcorn is now being produced which is said to give greater expansion in popping than ordinary sorts. This makes the popcorn more tender and allows the dealer to get more bags of popped corn from a given amount.

Trucks now haul about one-sixth as much freight as railroads, and farmers operate about one-fourth of all trucks in the country. Because the federal government wants a complete inventory of transportation available, a detailed registration of all farmer-owned trucks will soon be undertaken.

Various kinds of combination foods are now being precooked and then frozen for sale to those who can thus take a frozen package, heat it, and serve it directly. One of the cross-continent airlines has already ordered a varied assortment of these precooked-frozen foods to be served on passenger planes.

Oregon and Washington fruit growers have been meeting a shortage in refrigerator cars by improving the refrigeration so more fruit can be shipped in a single car. One method is to use dry ice, found particularly valuable in shipping cherries. Pear shippers, by precooking the fruit, are able to load nearly half again as many pears in a car as is possible otherwise.

Deaths from suffocation occur fairly frequently in silos when no provision for ventilation is made. In an ordinary above-ground silo ventilation is accomplished by keeping the doors open above the silage. With underground silos it is always safest to test for carbon dioxide by lowering a chicken to the top of the cut silage and ob-

serving it for five minutes before allowing a man to enter. The gas if there may be driven out by raising and lowering a blanket 20 or 30 times.
