Carnival Grosses \$700.00.

The annual Cottage Grove high school carnival of October 24 grossed \$700.05, and was perhaps the schools' greatest financial suc-cess to date. The final count of votes in the queen and king con-test for each class and the amount of money turned in by each are: Seniors, 33,010 votes, \$163.40; freshmen, 27,150 votes, \$109.80; juniors, 10,920 votes, \$60.70; soph-omores, 9,940 votes, \$49.50. A total of \$383.40 was made on the king and queen contest alone. The senior queen and king, Phyllis Sorenson and Mervin England, won the contest and were crown-ed in the auditorium with little Billy West as crown-bearer. The auditorium was packed to over-flowing, about 1000 persons at-tending the program. Many amus-ing number made up the program, perhaps the most mirth-provoking being the school room scene.

B-Squad Upsets Roseburg.

The Grove B-Squad upset the Roseburg B-Squad Saturday af-ternoon at Kelly field by a score of 21-0. Harpole recovered the kick-off on the 20-yard line put-ting the Lions in scoring position. A pass from Hammond to Hamil-ton was good for a touchdown. Hammond went over guard for the extra point.

The second touchdown came in the first quarter when Dugan re-covered a fumble which again put the Lions in scoring position. Hammond went over on a line plunge. The try for the extra point was good.

In the second quarter Ewing, right guard, intercepted a parti-cularly blocked pass and ran 45 yards to pay dirt. The try for the extra point was good, making the score 21-0. The rest of the game the Lions were held scoreless.

An extra quarter was played by the freshmen. The Lions again won by a score of 14-0. The first touchdown came when "Jackrab-bit" Jackson ran back a punt from the 50-yard line for a touchdown. Edwards ran around end for the extra point. This made the score 7-0. The second touchdown came when Harpole went off table for 50 yards to pay dirt.

Navy Offers Many Opportunities to Young Men Now

At the suggestion of Secretary of Navy Knox, W. C. Martin of the Sentinel has been made Navy Editor, to help the navy in giving ambitious local young men infor-mation about the opportunities for technical training and ad-vancement as they serve their country in its emergency.

According to an announcement made public in Washington, a limited number of additional men be-tween the ages of 17 and 50 will be given a chance, by enlistment in the Navy and Naval Reserve, to get to the top, with big pay, in jobs which by their aptitude and as a result of examination they show themselves fitted, from among nearly 50 different trades and vocations. These include such callings as aviation machinist, dental technician, photographer, diesel engineer, radio technician, electrician, welder, storekeeper and baker. Enlisted men may also qualify for commissions as offi-cers.

Beginning this week, the Navy plans for a limited time to accept new qualified men for training. These men will be sent to one of four Naval Training stations and may have a chance to go to a navy trade school even before as-

signment to the fleet. During this period they will be given regular navy pay and the navy's free schooling is valued at hundreds of dollars.

"Never in the history of the United States has there been greater opportunity for loyal young Americans to serve their country and build their futures than right now," said Secretary Knox.

In outlining the many advan-tages offered by enlistment in the United States Navy, Mr. Martin, Navy Editor of the Sentinel said, "It is possible for a bright young man to increase his pay seven times during his first enlistment and he can earn as much as \$126 a month. This monthly figure is actually worth much more when it is remembered that the man has few living expenses and is provided with the finest of medi-cal and dental care.

"You have all your food and lodging, and also your original

outfit of clothing provided by Uncle Sam free." Mr. Martin con-tinued. "In addition there are free sports and entertainment—even to the latest Hollywood pictures. On top of this you get free travel and adventure in colorful places—a thing few civilians can afford.

"When you consider the size of this country and the fact that the Navy will select only 15,000 ap-plicants a month from many times that number throughout the United States, the quotation, 'Many are called but few are chosen,' will apply to local young men in-terested.

"Navy men are a 'hand-picked' lot. Candidates must be men of more than average intelligence and ambition, of fine moral char-acter and must have the written recommendation of at least two local townspeople."

As Navy Editor, Mr. Martin has just received from Washington a supply of free illustrated booklets for all men interested and, in ad-

dition, will welcome inquiries from young men who wish to look into the new and greater opportunities the Navy now offers for training for future civilian careers as they serve their country now in its emergency.
