

Ex-University of Oregon Student is Killed at Eugene

Douglas Donsted, 20, ex-University of Oregon student of Coquille died early Sunday morning in the Eugene hospital as the result of injuries received when he drove directly into the path of a south-bound Southern Pacific freight train at the Jefferson street crossing in Eugene.

The accident occurred at 2:30 a. m. and the freight train had just left the yards so was going only about 15 miles per hour. The engine carried the car approximately a block and a half. Apparently the youth did not see the train for there were no skid marks at the scene of the accident, city police report.

Miss Esther Ecklund of Eugene a passenger in the car, was also in the hospital suffering cuts, bruises and shock, but her condition was not serious.
