Lions Bounce Back In League Race

(High School News.)

The Cottage Grove Lions bounced back from their defeat last week by Springfield in flying colors by running around, over and through the Roseburg Indians to the tune of 33-7 on Kelly field Friday night.

The Indians drew first blood in the opening seconds when the Young to Anderson passing attack netted the first touchdown. Young drop-kicked for extra point. This sudden attack would seem to darken the hopes for the Lions, but it only spurred them on and after that the Indians were never in the game. Taking the kick-off on the 14-yard line the Lions started rolling. Breaking out with a blistering attack of reverses and end runs they drove to the Indians 5-yard line where Lusk went over center for the Lions' first score. He went over center for the conversion, making the score 7-7. In the second quarter the Lions completely dominated the field. With Lusk carrying the ball on two runs, one for 28 yards and the other for 10, the Lions netted two more touchdowns as the half ended 20-7 for the Grovers.

In the second half the two halves, Dugan and Minor couldn't be held for no gain. They consistently made long gains which put the Lions in scoring position for two more touchdowns, one from the 5-yard line where Lusk went over, and the other on a reverse from Minor to Dugan, after Calkins had fumbled the Lions kick-off on the 17-yard stripe and the Grovers recovered. The attempted conversions were good, making the final score 33-7. The game was the best played by the Lions this season. The blocking and tackling was excellent, and the ball carrying of Dugan, Lusk and Minor, supported by a line that played superb ball was too much for the Indians. The Lions rolled up 391 yards to the opponents 21 and made 18 first downs to Roseburg's three. The Lions had to kick only once, early in the first quarter. It was interesting to note that the Lions did not throw a single pass. All yardage was made by rushing.

THIS WEEK IN DEFENSE

Aid to Britain and Russia.

The Maritime commission announced delivery of the first of 60 emergency cargo boats being built for the British. The President signed the \$5,985,000,000 second lend-lease appropriation and created in the Office for Emergency Management a Lend-Lease Administration with Edward R. Stettinius Jr. as administrator.

Pan-American Relations.

The Export-Import bank authorized a \$6,000,000 credit to the Banco Obrero, Venezuela, and announced special credit arrangements with banks in Latin America will be made to facilitate trade among the nations of the western hemisphere to enable the American republics to procure essential requirements for development of their resources and stabilization of their economies.

Prices.

The Labor Department reported its daily price index of 28 basic commodities rose 1.3 percent during the week of October 17 to 24, bringing prices in the index to more than 34 percent higher than a year ago.

A comprehensive program was announced to stabilize prices of all products made of copper, brass or their alloys. A price schedule was also issued on glycerine and bed sheets. Sheet prices will be approximately 15 percent below current market levels.

Employment and Wages.

Secretary of Labor Perkins reported average hourly earnings of factory wage earners were 74.5 cents during August. Federal Security Administrator McNutt announced 545,700 jobs were filled through the state employment services during September—55 percent more than last year.

Labor Disputes.

The President directed Secretary of War Stimson to take possession of and operate the Bendix, N. J., plant of Air Associates, Inc., after a dispute developed at the plant over the reinstatement of strikers on the recommendation of the defense mediation board. Colonel Roy M. Jones, in charge of 2,100 soldiers who took over the plant, said, "employees desiring to return to their jobs will be given all necessary protection."

Defense Housing.

1,285 publicly-financed defense homes were completed during the week ended October 25, it was reported, bringing the total ready for occupancy to 46,572. Homes being built or already completed under the defense program now number 101,785.

Civilian Morale.

The office of education announced that in cooperation with the office of civilian defense it will develop a school and college civilian Morale Service through which "hundreds of thousands of teachers, educational leaders and citizen volunteers" can participate in the defense program by organizing "Freedom's Forums" in schools, colleges, clubs, churches and libraries to discuss national problems "with respect to facts and without hysteria."

Civilian Supply.

Priorities Director Nelson ordered a 35 percent reduction in the use of steel by non-mechanical ice refrigerator manufacturers and a 17 percent cut in production of domestic washers and ironers. Mr. Nelson said that in one year 32,000 tons of steel would be saved by the latter cut.

Army.

Secretary of War Stimson announced that specially selected signal corps reserve officers are in England studying air-raid defense prior to assignment with the U. S. Army Aircraft Warning Service. Mr. Stimson also announced the first battalion of the 87th Infantry Mountain Regiment—first regiment designed for mountain warfare—will be organized at Ft. Lewis, Washington, this month. The regiment will be made up of men specially skilled in mountain climbing and ski and snowshoe travel.

Ships.

Maritime Commission launched two more Liberty ships. The Navy announced the 368 craft in its small-boat building program are being built by 76 firms throughout the country to spread the work as far as possible.

Power.

Priorities Director Nelson inaugurated a power conservation program calling for curtailment of the use of power by non-defense industry in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee unless heavy rains end the power shortage in these States before November 10. Program would prohibit use of power for advertising signs, shop windows, and night athletic events.

AUTO PLAN.

The problem of how to adjust matters between the demands of armaments and the auto industry so as to take care of defense needs without cutting car output to an uneconomic low level has been a major one for months. Now SPAB has a 14-point plan, presented by Joseph W. Frazer, president of the OPM automobile advisory committee, that would "release 454,808,270 pounds of raw materials for defense and at the same time keep civilian transportation wheels rolling." Basic features of the plan: production of only the lightest-weight car or series now being built by each parent manufacturer; allocation of production on the basis of critical materials used, volume needed for successful plant operation, and number of dealers dependent on a manufacturer; elimination of deluxe models and production of only two-door and four-door sedan models. It gets down to brass tacks in calling for a master inventory to determine the amount of raw materials available after military and lend-lease requirements have been filled, and then "allocation of these materials to the industries producing items essential to the civilian effort as it relates to defense."

KNOX NOT APPLICANT FOR FAIR JOB.

Fred Knox, who has managed the Lane county fair for the past two years, Tuesday notified the county fair board that he was not an applicant for the position of secretary-manager. The board has received the application of Jed Wheeler of Trent for the place, but has taken no action.

S. highway No. 1 through the orchard district would have resulted in heavy interference with the movement of the peach crop by motor truck. The State Department of Agriculture put up an appeal for delayed which was done. In North Carolina it's "Crops Before Concrete."

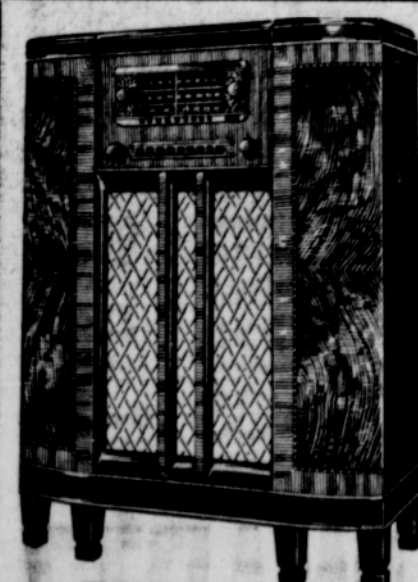
