

Phone Company Increases Workers By 23 Percent

With unprecedented demands for telephone service, largely due to defense activities, the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company in Oregon has increased the number of its employees more than 23 per cent within the last year, according to C. M. Brodersen, Eugene manager for the company. Monthly payrolls for the company in Oregon have zoomed to the near half-million mark in this state.

"Not only has it been necessary to hire additional employees in all departments of the telephone organization," Brodersen said, "but an additional department has been formed to work in direct cooperation with the military and naval forces and defense industries. This new department, in the engineering division, expedites every effort to see that the defense organizations are served with required telephone communications."

Brodersen stressed the importance of a well-trained telephone personnel during the present emergency.

"Adequate communication facilities are vital," he declared, "and must be installed quickly in all establishments and bases connected directly or indirectly with the military. That responsibility rests on the independent and Bell system telephone companies."

"At present 34 Pacific company employees in Oregon are on leave filling military posts from colonels on down. Most of them are in technical branches where the knowledge they have gained in the telephone business now is being used advantageously by our expanding forces of defense."

Louise Home Drive Has Started Here

Men's and women's service clubs, churches and socially-minded citizens of Cottage Grove are being contacted in the effort to organize a drive to solicit funds for the Pacific Protective Society. The drive is state wide, with the former Mayor Joseph K. Carson, Jr., of Portland serving as the state chairman for the campaign. Among the honorary sponsors listed for the campaign is City School Superintendent H. B. Ferrin of Cottage Grove. The campaign is being conducted in Lane county under the direction of a county committee, who are Mrs. L. F. Bonson, Eugene, chairman, Mrs. Genevieve Turnipseed, secretary, and H. V. Johnson, treasurer. Miss Mary Jewel Ladd, a member of the staff at the Louise Home is here this week in the interest of organizing the campaign in Cottage Grove and assisting the Lane county committee in the drive. The funds to be raised will be used to increase the facilities of the Louise home.

The Louise home is a girls' village situated about nine miles east of Portland. It is non-denominational, non-sectarian, non-racial hospital, school and home—caring for three distinct classes of girls: clean delinquent cases, who are housed in the Louise home building; clean maternity cases, which are housed in the maternity cottage and venerable and venerable-maternity cases, who are housed in the juvenile hospital. Admission is by parents, guardians, voluntary application or court order. Age limits are from 12 to 21 years. The home now has a capacity of 100 girls, which has become inadequate and must be improved.

The Louise Home has served Lane county and the state of Oregon for the past 35 years and within the last three years it has served Lane county by caring for 39 girls from this county.

The Lane county committee is anxious that citizens of the county understand that funds received in this drive will not go for maintenance but for building and improvement.

O. AND C. TAXES TOTAL \$106,987.60.

Lane county last week received from the United States government two checks totaling \$106,987.60 as payment of two separate amounts due as taxes on the O. and C. land grant in this county.

The sum received in one check for \$39,481.91 is apportioned to the several tax districts of the county while the other for \$67,505.69 goes to the county road fund.

CEILING BOOSTED FOR FARM STUFF.

The house banking committee was reported at Washington Saturday to have voted to recommend a price control bill allowing ceiling prices on farm products to be substantially higher than the previously considered 110 per cent of parity.

Members said the committee had decided to list three alternatives for fixing such prices and to require the price administrator to use whichever is the highest. The three:

110 per cent of parity, the average farm prices from 1919 to '29, and the average of prices last October 1.

As for price ceilings on non-farm items, the committee was said to have favored basing these on October 1 levels.

These levels were considerably higher than those of the July 29 base date mentioned when the price control bill was introduced.

Farmers Are Asked to Step Up Production Series of Conferences

Lane county farmers were asked to step up their production for 1942 in a series of farm conferences held over the county the past week. Increases were requested in the following commodities: Milk 12 percent, milk cows 6 percent, eggs 14 percent, pigs 14 percent, chickens and turkeys 10 percent, farm gardens, 38 percent.

FOREST OFFICER PROMOTED.

C. Otto Lindh has been promoted from chief of fire control to assistant regional forester, according to Lyle F. Watts, regional forester, U. S. department of agriculture.

"Until now fire control has been handled as a branch of operation along with such things as budget control and purchasing. The importance of the office in the North Pacific region justifies expanding it to a division, ranking with timber management, grazing, and the others," Watts said. "The huge values represented by the public resources on the national forests

require protection of a high order. That is one of the most important of forest service management activities.

Rainfall at Blackbutte measured 3.39 inches for the month of October, according to Mrs. L. Stimmel, weather observer. The greatest single fall was on the 12th measuring 1.15 inches.
