## Timely Recipes

### Scalloped Cauliflower.

- 1 medium head cauliflower
- 2 cups milk
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper

Remove outer stalks from the cauliflower; then break it into flowerets. Cook until tender; drain, and arrange in a casserole. Combine the remaining ingredients and pour over the cauliflower. Bake in a moderate oven of 375 deg. for 40 minutes. Serves 6.
