

Sid George Guest Speaker at Lions Club November 6

Sid George of Eugene, past department commander of the American Legion, was a guest speaker at the Lions club last Thursday, addressing the club on the motto of the Legion in observance of Armistice week. Six past commanders of the Calvin Funk Post American Legion were also guests of the club: George Matthews, Joe Smith, Claude Sherman, Vinal Randall, Bill Haldeman and Alvis Wicks.

The speaker was introduced by Robert Fromm, and accompanied by Mr. Fromm, addressed the high school student body in the afternoon.

Speaking on the motto of the American Legion "For God and Country," Mr. George told of the demoralization which followed the demobilization of the European armies of the World War. America alone escaped with the organization and assistance of the Legion, he said. But the demoralizing effect of the World War laid the groundwork for the present conflict, a conflict President Wilson sought to avoid with the submission of fourteen points at the Treaty of Versailles.

The present objective of the American Legion he said was to defeat Hitlerism and to remove as far as possible the cause of future conflicts.

SLUG INFESTATION BEING HANDLED BY POISONING.

The infestation of slugs through out western Oregon is just as bad, if not worse, this year than last, but growers are successfully combating the pests with poison bait, reports Dr. Don C. Mote, head of the entomology department in the O.S.C. experiment station.

The poison, first found effectively last year and now used generally, is composed of metaldehyde and calcium arsenate as the active ingredients, with a bran carrier. It is available in both loose and pellet form, with the latter apparently somewhat more effective and more economical, says Dr. Mote.

Both types are broadcast over the infested area, either by hand or by using a horn-type seeder. The loose material is applied at approximately 10 pounds per acre, while the pellets are effective when applied four pounds per acre. Even though the latter type costs slightly more per pound, the per acre cost is materially less, Dr. Mote points out. Most western Oregon feed and seed dealers are now carrying slug poison in bulk quantities.

Excellent control is being obtained with this poison except where it is spread too late or not uniformly. In some cases the slugs have done so much damage to seedling crimson clover or similar crops before the poison was applied that reseeding was necessary. Unless cold weather serves to check the activity of the slugs, poisoning may still be carried out throughout the fall, says Dr. Mote.

Heavy or continued rains reduce the effectiveness of the poison, although better kills are obtained in humid weather when slugs are most active rather than in dry, sunny periods. A series of mild winters plus abundant late summer and early fall rains is blamed for the exceptionally heavy infestations of slugs for the past two years.

Railroad Strike Threatened Dec. 5

Threat of a nation-wide stoppage of freight and passenger train movements in the pre-Christmas season prevailed Saturday as the leader of the big Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen said 350,000 men would desert the rolling stock of the vital transportation system December 5.

While A. F. Whitney, trainmen's president, forecast a walkout of all the operating union members on that date, the heads of the other four unions agreed that a strike was inevitable but would not immediately set a date.

The five unions have demanded a 30 percent increase in wages for the trainmen, engineers, switchmen, firemen and engine-men. The lowest paid get \$5.06 daily, and President Roosevelt's fact-finding board in the carrier-employee dispute has recommended a temporary increase of 7 1/2 percent, with a reconsideration of wage needs at the end of next year.

A table in the fact-finding board's report to the president showed an average salary-wage of employes of class 1 railroads in 1940 to be \$1,913.
