

## State Corn Show Contest to Test Present Champ

Will anyone be able to dethrone C. A. Marsh of Albany as the Oregon cornshucking champion? This question is being asked in connection with the forthcoming fifth annual Oregon State corn show at Corvallis December 12 and 13, when the annual cornshucking contest will be a usual feature.

For the past two years Marsh, an ex-Iowa corn grower, has led the field and has "two legs" on the championship cup, which becomes a permanent possession if won three years. Runners-up last year were J. G. Morgan, Brownsville, and Walter Woods, Corvallis.

The shucking contest will be held at 9:30 o'clock Friday, the first day of the show. It is open to all Oregon corn growers, with winners receiving five merchandise prizes in addition to the championship cup.

Marsh was also winner of the corn growers' judging contest last year, the runners-up being Otto Lucht of Molalla, and Elvin Asher of Dayton. This contest will be held Friday forenoon too.

The sweepstakes trophy in the corn show itself was won last year by Clayton Nyberg, Tualatin, who was also champion in the hybrid corn class. E. G. Wiesner, Brooks, sweepstakes winner for two years, won the championship in the open pollinated class last year, and is expected to be a strong contender again this year.

Hybrid corn growers will again compete for yield honors, with the state divided into two districts. Requirements in this class are that at least three acres must have been grown, with the yield checked and the samples submitted by the county agent. Last year F. S. Green of Stanfield was champion with a yield of 125.69 bushels per acre, while L. O. Gorman of Crabtree won in western Oregon with a yield of 67.16 bushels.

### LOG PRODUCTION IN OREGON INCREASING.

Oregon's log production increased in the past decade while Washington's declined, a report by the Pacific northwest experiment station of the forest service said Saturday.

Washington reached its logging peak in 1929, cutting 7,400,000,000 board feet, while Oregon reached its peak of 5,300,000,000 board feet in 1937. Since 1937 Oregon has exceeded its neighbor by 300,000,000 board feet, the report said.

Eastern Oregon Ponderosa pine production has increased fourfold since 1932, reaching a high of 1,500,000,000 feet in 1940.

## Our Nat'l Defense

More than 1,000,000 persons participated in the recent national defense aluminum collection campaign.

Needless loss of life and property is hampering National Defense, so President Roosevelt has asked the National Safety Council to lead a nation-wide campaign against accidents on the highway, on the job or at home.

To direct health measures among the 250,000 coolies building the 1,700-mile railroad paralleling the Burma Road, an allotment of \$1,500,000 of lend-lease funds has been made.

In the interest of National Defense, the army will use one type of standard gasoline instead of the four varieties formerly used.

In the interest of National Defense the U. S. government is purchasing the entire Mexican mercury production.

In asking 50,000 young women to begin training for professional nursing careers, Surgeon General Parnan of the U. S. Public Health Service stated that 22,000 nurses were on active duty in the last World War.

Plans to train 404 pilots, 120 service mechanics and 20 aeronautical engineers from other American Republics have been announced.

It is estimated that nearly 19,000,000 man-years of labor will be required to complete the defense program already set up by Congressional appropriations.

The Department of Agriculture estimated the 1941 corn crop at 2,587,574,000 bushels; cotton crop, 10,817,000 bales.

Helmets used by the Armored Forces of the U. S. Army are adaptations of those used by football players.

More than 232,000 tons of scrap rails have been left imbedded in city streets of the United States. It is estimated. Plans are being made to salvage this scrap for national defense.

The Navy Department on August 12, 1941, had five billion dollars worth of ships and parts either under private contract or under construction in navy yards.

Production of white-wall tires, which take two pounds more of crude rubber than ordinary tires, has been banned in the interest of national defense.

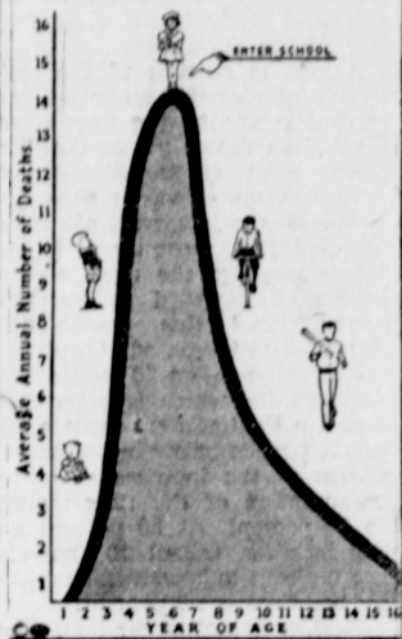

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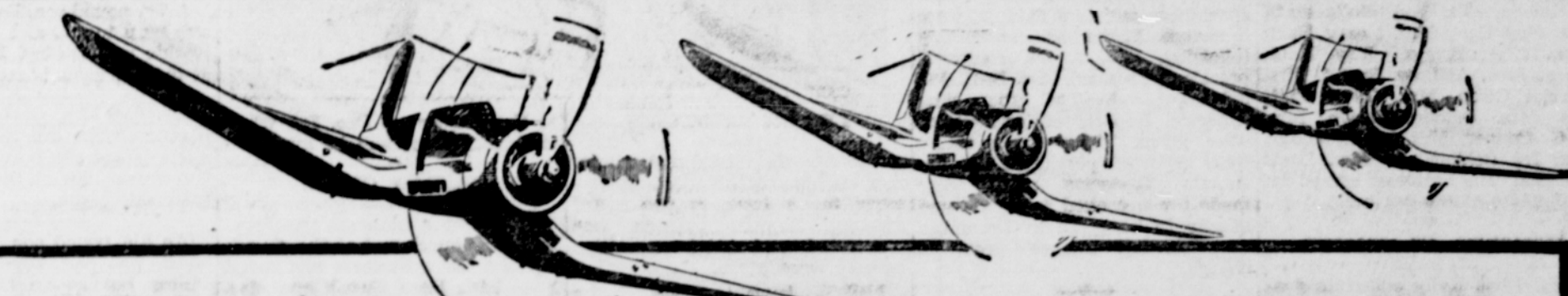
