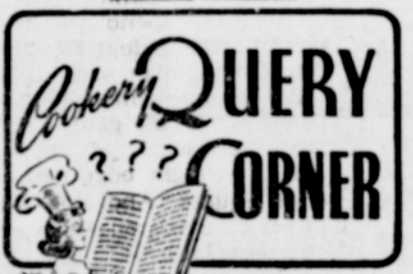
Report on Willamette Council held in Eugene last Sunday, were given by Marie Wicks and Hester Reed, who represented this unit.

Soft Tires Cause Of Loss of Power

It costs a motorist real money to drive with even slightly under inflated tires, according to an engineering study reported by Pontiac Motor Division.

A certain amount of the car's power necessarily must be expended in driving the tires themselves, the report points out. The power consumption of tires at proper pressures varies according to speed—the faster the car is being driven the more power is necessary to drive the tires. As tire pressure is lowered below that recommended this power consumption is increased sharply.

For instance—at 20 percent under inflation which is quite common (in Pontiac's case this would be six pounds below recommended pressure) the increase of power consumption of the tires mounts to 13 percent. At 30 percent under inflation (about 10 pounds) the increase in power consumption by the tires is 23 percent.

Besides actual power loss, other better known results of under inflation are cracked sidewalls, increased overall wear, hard steering and uneven brake adjustments.

Parley as Funeral Decoration The Greeks used parley as a decoration at funerals and the expression, "To be in need of parley," meant to be at death's door.

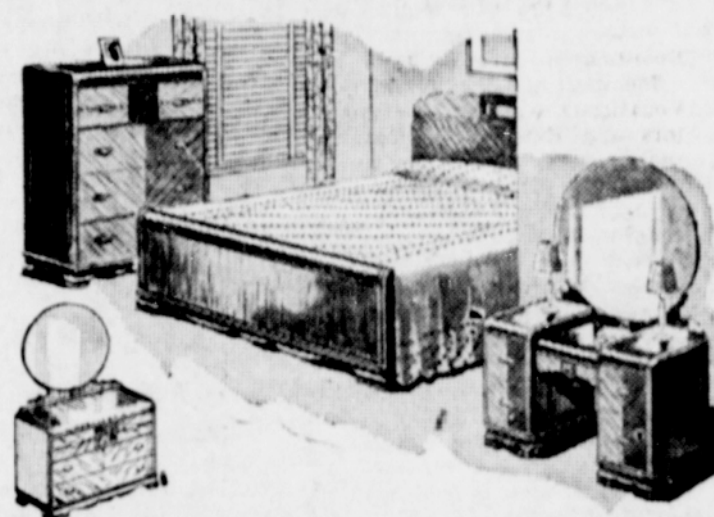

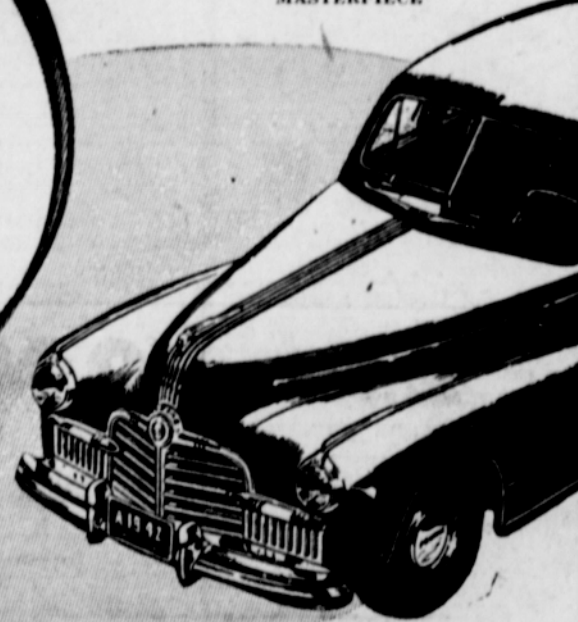
