LOUISE WILLIAMS, 19, of Portland, named by State Club Leader H. C. Seymour as Oregon's 1941 4-H canning champion, will be awarded an all-expense trip to the 20th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 28-Dec. 6. The honor climaxes an eight-year record. . . . The girl put up 3,113 quarts of foods, and handled 26 fowls. With her teammate, she won a canning demonstration at the county fair and placed first at the Pacific International in home economics judging last year. She also won \$30.38 on 51 individual canning exhibits. Total value of all her projects is \$2,264.77. . . . She will compete for one of five \$200 scholarships provided by the Kerr Glass Corporation, donor also of her trip. This is the 13th year of the contest, which is conducted in cooperation with the extension service.
