Navy Now Accepts Enlistments from Two to Four Years

Lieutenant Glenn F. DeGrave, officer in charge of navy recruiting in the Portland district, recently announced the receipt of a telegram from the navy's bureau of navigation informing him that the naval reserve will henceforth accept enlistments for periods ranging from two to four years. In the past, reservists have been required to sign up for four years.

The new regulation also provided for the enlistment of boys between 17 and 18 for minority. Minority enlistments, previously limited to the regular Navy, expire on the day before the man's 21st birthday.

As in the past, reservists enlisting for 2, 3, 4 years, or for minority, will be required to remain on active duty for the duration of the emergency. In the event that the emergency ends prior to the expiration of the enlistment period, reservists will be released from active duty and returned to their homes.

Lieutenant DeGrave explained that the new regulation does not affect the navy's trade training program. Men enlisting under one of the new periods will be offered the same opportunity for training in the Navy schools that those who enlisted for four years have had heretofore.

Said Lt. DeGrave, "Training facilities are now being expanded at a tremendous rate in order to accommodate the increased number of enlistments which will come as a result of the new set-up. Since the number of men trained in specialized work must remain in constant ratio to the number of men in the fleet, the training program must keep pace with enlistments." Continuing, the Lieutenant remarked, "Navy Reserve enlistments are now running ahead of those of the regular branch of the service because of the opportunity offered to serve and get trade training for the period of the emergency. Boys who want to come to the aid of the country, but who hesitate to sign for the 6 year period are taking advantage of the 'duration' clause to do their part without obligating themselves for longer than they are needed. We are confident that a new increase will result from this chance to sign up for only 2 or 3 years."

Rites for William Ostrander the 9th

Rites for William H. Ostrander, 76, were held at the Mills Chapel Tuesday afternoon with the Rev. Willard Elkin and Gordon Hynes officiating. Interment was in the Masonic L.O.O.F. cemetery. Mr. Ostrander died in a Eugene hospital Saturday afternoon. He had lived here for fifty-three years, over a half century, and for the past twenty-five years had been employed at the Chambers mill. He was born at Grant Park, Illinois, July 11, 1865, and on September 26, 1906, was married to Mae Land of Erskine, Minnesota. Mr. Ostrander was a former member of the Oregon national guard, 6th company, and served this organization for eight years. Surviving are the widow and three daughters, Mrs. Hazel E. Spencer of Albany, Mrs. Helen Dove of Eugene and Miss Harriett B. Ostrander of Cottage Grove; one brother, Royal C. Ostrander of Port Orford, and four grandchildren.
