## Time-Honored Custom Continues With Nash Auto

The time-honored custom of acquiring a new automobile by easy stages continues in force, despite a general public misconception of new installment-buying regulations, according to Cecil Beck of the Golden Rule Auto Service, automobile dealer here.

Mr. Beck said that the policy of local dealers still permits motorists to buy new cars with a down payment of one-third and subsequent payments extending over 18 months. Many motorists mistakenly believe this is no longer possible, he said.

He said that dealers have not changed their policy of allowing full value for used cars and applying them against the down payment.

"Actually, we are selling our new cars on just about the same basis as we always have," Beck declared. "Naturally, in line with efforts of the Government and business to keep installment buying on a sensible level, we have eliminated excessive extension of time payments and unusually small down payments. In general, however, the motorist will buy his new 1942 car on the same generous terms as he has always bought his cars."

Motorists here, and throughout the country, he said, misunderstand the new regulations, which actually were established to curb unsound buying and do not greatly affect the old-established methods of automobile merchandising at retail.

He said that in the case of the new Nash '600', a newcomer in

the low-price field, the used car traded in very frequently covered the entire down payment.

## Committeemen of All Counties to Attend AAA Meet

Farmers who adopt and direct the AAA farm program in Oregon's 36 counties will meet at Oregon State college December 15-17 to discuss the past year's achievements and problems and express their ideas on the makeup of future programs.

Work at this year's state AAA conference, the second annual event, will be led and directed by farmers and ranchers who make up county AAA committees. With few speakers on the program, most of the three-day conference will be taken up with committee meetings and reports. Committee chairmen, all farmer-committeemen, were announced as follows:

Education, Glen Cumberland, Clackamas county; county office management, Layton Mann, Umatilla county; range and pasture development, Jack French, Grant county; soil building practices and conservation materials, Chester Wendt, Jackson county; crop insurance, wheat and statistical, Henry Baker, Morrow county; seed purchase program, Robert Pence, Polk county.

Agriculture's all-out program to provide abundant food supplies for American defense workers and military workers and lend-lease aid to Britain imposes a new responsibility on AAA committeemen. County and community committeemen have recently completed a farm-to-farm survey of potential 1942 production. The results of this survey and problems attendant to achieving the production called for under the food for freedom program will receive considerable attention at the conference.

Representatives of AAA's western division who will attend the conference include Arthur Cummings, assistant to the director, Washington, D. C.; Fred Enterline, commodity loan specialist, Baker; and Jack Hartline, division of information, Denver.

The second day of the conference will coincide with the first day of the annual all staff conference of the division of agriculture at Oregon State college including the extension staff in home economics. A joint session will be held with outstanding speakers addressing the combined group.

### THREE GET DIPLOMAS.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON.—Hugh W. Brisbane, Guy H. ### NEW MAP.

A new physiographic map of Oregon, showing in considerable detail mountains, valleys, and other topographic features of the State, has just been released by the State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries.

The map, covering a sheet 17 by 22 inches, was prepared as a part of a larger map of the northwest by Dr. Erwin Raisz of Harvard University, for the Institute of Geophysical Exploration, and is on a scale of about 50 miles to the inch. The department believed that such a map would be of con-

siderable value to schools and colleges of the State for geographical and regional studies, as well as being of general public interest, and there over secured the Oregon section of the map for publication.
