

Lions Win Third Cage Game Tues.

In a rough and tumble game the Cottage Grove Lions won their third straight game of the season, defeating the Drain Warriors here Tuesday night.

The first half was a slowly contested one, with the score 17-11 for the Lions. In the second half the Lions got hot. With Minor and Wicks hitting the basket from all angles, the Lions rolled up a 34 to 14 third-period score. In the third quarter the Lions held Drain to one field goal and a free throw. In the fourth quarter the Lions seemed to slow down as Coach Preece sent his reserves in to play the remaining seven minutes but they were still able to run the count to 41 points, while they held Drain in that period to but five points as the game ended 41 to 19 for the Lions. This marked the third win for the Lions in as many starts. Minor and Wicks were the big guns for the Lions, with 12 and 10 points respectively. Steinbacher and Motton showed well for the Warriors.

In the opener the baby Lions were able, with a field goal in the last seconds of play, to eke out a 25-23 win over the Drain "B" team. Keele was outstanding for the Lions with 10 points. Motton scored 16 for Drain.

Mrs. B. Bukowski Juel Dies at Her Home Yesterday

Mrs. Barbara Carrie Bukowski Juel, 74, passed away at her home at 722 South 6th street yesterday morning after a lingering illness. She was born December 4, 1867, in Prague, Czechoslovakia, and came to America at the age of four years, settling at Farwell, Nebraska, where she lived until she married J. S. Bukowski at St. Paul, Nebraska, in 1890. To this union were born six children. In 1920 she married H. P. Juel in Oklahoma where she lived until coming to Cottage Grove in 1935, following the death of her husband. She was a member of the Catholic church and the Catholic Altar society.

Surviving are two daughters: Mrs. Mary Kachel of Balco, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Anna Bush of Cottage Grove; four sons, C. J. Bukowski of Arcadia, Nebraska; E. J. Bukowski of Chester, Oklahoma; P. S. Bukowski and E. P. Bukowski, both of Cottage Grove; a brother, Frank of Phroso, Oklahoma, and a nephew, Victor Buresh of Eugene.

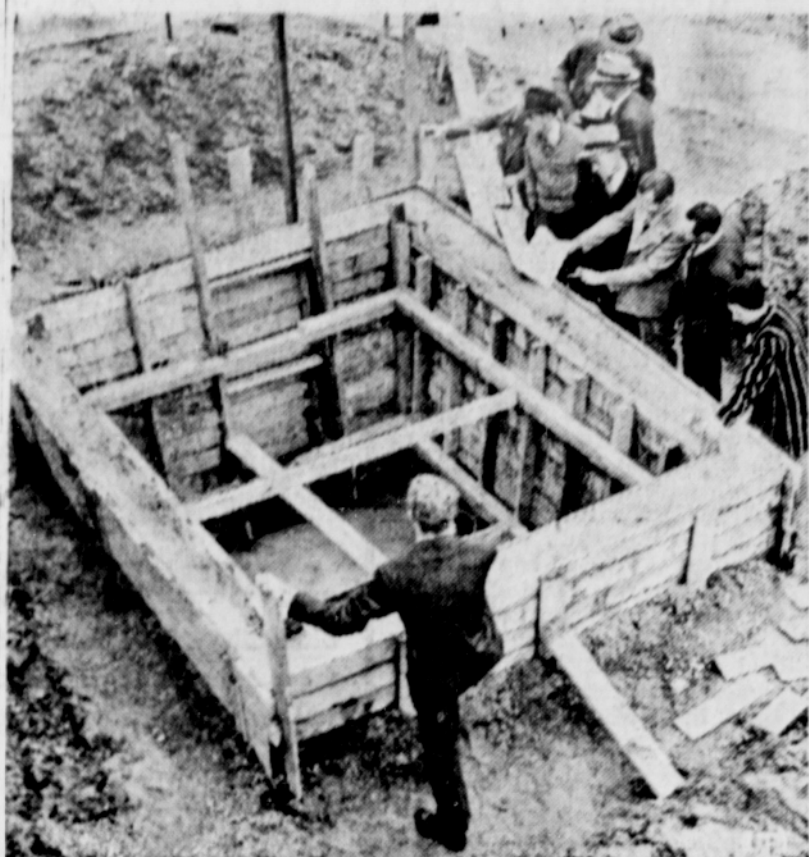
Funeral arrangements are pending at the Smith Chapel.

On the suggestion of Roy Short and the motion of H. E. Eakin the Chamber voted \$10.00 toward the local fund to aid in carrying out work connected with the national emergency.

Dr. Gordon Wright Addresses Lions

Dr. Gordon Wright, assistant professor of history at the University of Oregon, was a guest speaker at the Lions club meeting last Thursday noon and gave an interesting 20-minute talk on "Russia's place in the Current Crisis." Dr. Wright who received his Ph.D. from Stanford University, was the holder of the American field fellowship to France in 1937-38 and is well versed in the European as well as the Oriental affairs. Russia is destined to play an increasing part in world affairs in the coming years. This despite the fact that the position of Russia is an enigma in many respects. Many Americans have already begun to wonder whether Russia is going to let America down in the present crisis, much of the fear is groundless, but the outcome will depend on the concessions America is willing to grant Russia, he said.

Tuesday, December 23, carols will be sung in the halls from 8:25 to 9:00 a. m.

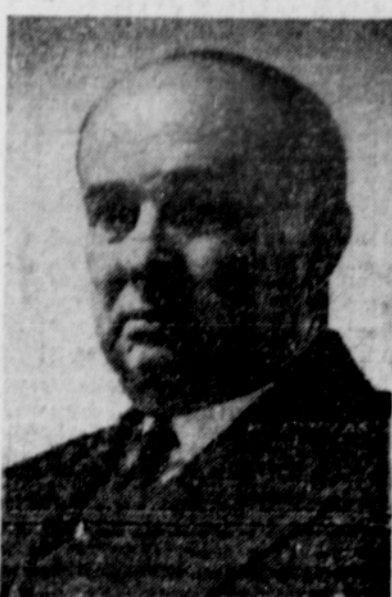

Over three and a half inches of rain had fallen here since the 15th up to 9:00 a. m. this morning, according to records of C. E. Stewart, weather observer. Rainfall measurements since the 15th are as follows: December 15, .40; 16, 1.81; 17, .76; 18 to 9:00 a. m., .65. Total 3.62. The Coast Fork office of the U. S.
