MILK PRICES BOOSTED

Milk prices were boosted here a cent a quart today under authority of the Oregon Milk Control board and effects all municipalities in the Eugene area. Four per cent milk was increased from twelve to thirteen cents per quart and five per cent milk increased to fifteen cents per quart. New cream prices are 16 cents per pint, 55 cents per quart. Skim milk was raised to seven cents per quart or twenty-five cents per gallon. Buttermilk 8 cents per quart or twenty-eight cents per gallon.

NEW YEAR USHERED IN WITHOUT NOISE

The New Year dawned in 1942 without noise, so far as this vicinity was concerned, although there were a number of watch parties and a New Year frolic by the American Legion and Auxiliary. The frolic, an annual affair, was said to have been very successful from every standpoint with a large but orderly crowd in attendance.

There were no outside noise makers in evidence here at midnight.

STATE GETS TIRE QUOTA

WASHINGTON—A nation that normally wears out about 4,000,000 tires a month tonight was allotted 114,191 new tires for the month of January. And these will be sold only to a greatly restricted list of eligible buyers under the rationing plan that will go into effect January 5.

Under the allotment, Oregon will receive 1,546 new tires and 1,294 new tubes for passenger cars, motorcycles and light trucks. For heavy trucks and buses, Oregon will receive 3,203 tires and 2,683 tubes.

Josef Hofmann to Be at McArthur Court January 7



EUGENE, January 1 (Special)—Josef Hofmann, hailed by critics the world over as the "greatest living pianist of our time," will be presented in concert here at McArthur court on Wednesday evening, January 7, as a feature of the University of Oregon's 1941-42 "Greater Artist" series.

Since he made his debut in this country in 1887, as a child of ten, Hofmann has year after year proven to be one of the greatest magnets for music lovers on the concert stage. He made his only other Eugene appearance in 1935. In his 54 years of concerts throughout America, Hofmann has won almost every honor possible. Only last season, his fifty-third, he played to 52,000 paid admissions, a record without parallel in music annals, in five New York city concerts.

Tickets for Hofmann's Eugene concert are now on sale at the A.S.U.O. ticket office in McArthur court, where mail and telephone reservations will be taken.
