AAA Meet Plans Anti-Waste Rules

Adoption of a conservation program for American motorists in which all drivers are urged to co-operate was a highlight of the 39th annual convention of the American Automobile Association last month, Dr. E. B. McDaniel, who represented the northwest at the conference, reports.

Dr. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association and vice president of the national group, outlined the anti-waste program as follows:

1. Drive slowly; unnecessary speed wastes fuel, is hard on tires and shortens the life of your car.
2. Continue to use your car for necessity and recreation but avoid unnecessary driving.
3. Keep car in tip-top operating condition at all times; lack of proper care hastens the car's trip to the junk yard.
4. Drive smoothly; avoid 'jack-rabbit' starts and slam-bang stops.
5. Keep tires properly inflated at all times; both over-inflation and under-inflation causes excessive wear.
6. Safety: aside from deaths and injuries, traffic accidents reap a terrific toll in automobile property which in the months to come will not be so easily replaceable as in the past.
7. Have your brakes inspected at frequent intervals; also check on front wheel alignment.
8. From time to time, shift the tires from wheel to wheel as a means of distributing wear.
9. Keep car well lubricated at all times and don't forget to change oil at intervals recommended by the manufacturer of your car.
10. In general, observe common sense rules of car care and cautious driving; by doing so you will help to save materials needed for national defense, you will reduce the likelihood of being involved in an accident, and you will realize substantial money savings in the operation of your car.

Shortage of Radio Men Is Imminent

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announced this week that a shortage of radio mechanics, operators and engineers appears to be imminent, if the anticipated demands of the various national defense agencies are to be met. In view of the large expansion in radio activity the demands being made by the various government agencies for qualified technicians and engineers as well as operators of radio equipment will require that a large number of qualified persons apply for governmental employment in the field of radio in which they are qualified. The Civil Service commission, through its representatives stationed in various localities is endeavoring to secure the number of qualified applicants needed. Persons who have had training and or experience in the field of radio should immediately call upon the Commission's representative at any first or second class post office and secure complete information concerning these positions. Application blanks and appropriate forms may also be secured from the commission's representative in the post office.

RESOURCES BOX SCORE.

The Commerce department has issued an interesting tabulation. It shows that the principal anti-axis belligerents, plus countries whose resources are more likely to be available to that "side," comprise a total population of 1,484,547,000 persons; whereas the population of axis and axis-dominated countries is 506,605,000. In wheat, anti-axis controls 69 per cent of the world supply, Axis, 21; in potatoes it's 34 to 62 in favor of the Axis; sugar—70 to 25 in "our" favor; petroleum—86 to 3; coal—67 to 29; iron ore—64 to 27. So it's "let 'em eat potatoes."

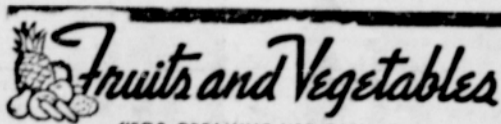
