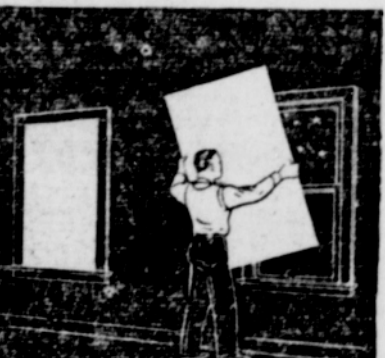
Mrs. Harris and children Sam, Arthur, Wilma and Ruth, have gone on a trip to Missouri to spend several months with relatives.
