As Echoed From Cottage Grove Union High School

Study Oregon.
Several weeks ago the high school teachers organized a plan which provides for a unit on the study of Oregon to be taken up throughout the school. Every class is incorporating the unit into its schedule. The history classes are studying the early exploration and settling of Oregon; the home economics division is taking up Oregon food products; the agricultural class is studying Oregon farming, and all other classes are cooperating by taking up some phase of the unit. State library books have been reserved in the school library for the students' use in research work. The purpose of the unit is to help students and teachers acquaint themselves more intimately with our state, its history and present day status.

Hall Tells of Germany.
Dr. Martin Hall, a newspaper man exiled from Germany, gave an interesting talk on government conditions and life of the German people, at last Friday's assembly sponsored by the Girls' League.

Dr. Martin Hall told of the undemocratic ways of the German government and of how the people of Germany were slaves of the Nazi leaders. He also stated in his discussion of the present war that no nation with such a low morale as that of the Germans could expect anything but ultimate defeat.

Dr. Hall was educated in Germany where he became a newspaper man. He has been in the United States only a short time, but says that there is nothing that can equal the freedom that we have here.

First Practice Air Raid Drill.
The high school had its first practice air raid drill Monday. In contradiction to previous orders, students are not to leave the building during an air raid. Students are to evacuate the class rooms and line up, three feet apart along the corridor walls. The corridor runs the entire length of the building and is bordered on both sides by class rooms. It is also lined with metal lockers, which would form protection against possible flying glass and fire.

Book Campaign On.
"Keep 'Em Reading, Too!" is the slogan for the "Victory Book Campaign" which is being sponsored by the nation and in Oregon by Charles A. Sprague and committees from defense organizations. The purpose of this campaign is to obtain good, clean, and interesting books from the people for the soldiers, sailors and marines. Our library is going to cooperate with the town library by collecting the books in the school. A receiving box will be placed in the reading room in which the donations are to be put. The library staff will then take the books to the public library and they in turn will send them to Salem which is the receiving center for this state. This campaign starts this week.

Mr. French, state instructor in automobile driving, gave the first driving lesson to high school students last Friday during fifth period.

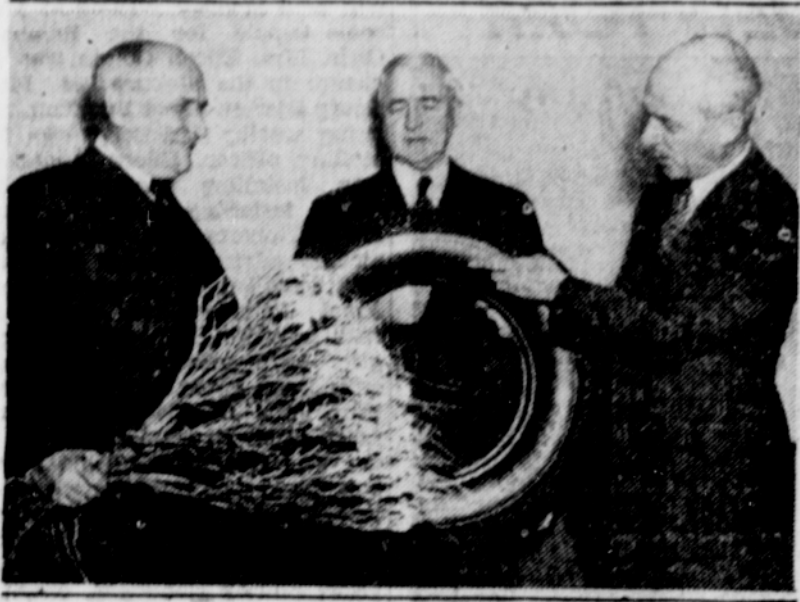

This American Tire Made From This American Bush



O'Neil Jones Kloesner
Proving that manufacture of tires from the American grown guayule shrub is practical, William O'Neil, president of The General Tire & Rubber Co., has turned over to Jesse Jones, secretary of commerce, a specimen of the mature plant and a tire made entirely of guayule rubber. The tire was made in the same General Tire plant and in the same machines used in making tires from far eastern rubber. O'Neil has urged the development of guayule as an emergency rubber supply for years. A bill now before Congress calls for the immediate planting of all available guayule seed in the states of Texas, California, New Mexico and Arizona. Because it is impossible to make a tire from synthetic rubber alone, O'Neil is urging the growth of guayule to supplement the 400,000 ton production of synthetic already announced by Jones. American Legion Posts in all parts of the country are supporting the O'Neil guayule program, which O'Neil discussed this week with Secretary Jones and H. J. Kloesner, president of the Rubber Reserve Corporation.
