

Gasco Is Enlisted For the Duration

If an American aviator asked you for some fuel from our car that would help him defeat Axis planes, would you let him have it?

Of course you would, gladly! That's why Shell Oil Company, Incorporated, announced today that Gasco Motor Fuel has been "enlisted for the duration." Gasco contains benzene and benzene is one of the raw materials most urgently needed for war purposes.

"Much of the benzene which local motorists have been burning in their cars will be added to 100-octane aviation gasoline to produce a new aviation fuel which tops anything used by the Axis," it was said here today by Shell's local manager, Roy F. Sunderland.

"Because of this new fuel made with benzene, American fighters will have faster take-off to meet the enemy and faster climb in dog fights. American bombers will be able to take off with heavier bomb loads.

"Another war use for benzene is in making artificial rubber. It is transformed into styrene which is combined with butadiene to produce the raw material needed for tires and special equipment for the army and navy.

"Shell is confident that Gasco users will accept this change in a patriotic spirit. Other gasolines will continue to be available as usual."

NYA Training For Ship Building

The ship building program in Oregon will soon need an additional 100,000 trained workers to do arc-welding, machinist, marine electrician, general sheet metal and other work. Mr. Batterson, area director of the National Youth Administration states.

It requires one fully loaded cargo ship to supply 100 soldiers for three months. The need to supply our soldiers is vital and urgent. Boys who are trained to build ships are helping directly to win the war.

To build ships rapidly and efficiently, the shipyards must have trained workers and in order to give this training, the NYA resident defense shops at Eugene, Albany and Chemawa, are newly equipped to provide training and work experience for young men 17 to 25 years of age in welding, machine shop, general sheet metal, and in cooperation with the vocational department of the state, through the Eugene vocational school, training for marine electrician, ship joinery, wood-working, painting and other work that is necessary to the building of ships.

Young men trained in the above fields at NYA resident defense centers may enter the shipyards without any doubt and present wage rates and changes for employment for those who have had basic training look very favorable. Base pay for beginning welders, for example, is \$1.12 per hour to start.

Between one and three months training is usually required for shipyard work. The length of training depends upon how much previous experience a worker has had, his ability, and his willingness to make full use of the training opportunity.

While training, boys receive \$20 per month, from which \$21 is deducted to pay for board and room facilities which are provided at the resident center. \$9 can usually be saved.

To qualify for training, one must register at United States employment offices and must be definitely and intently interested in helping win the war by accepting employment in ship building or other war production work.

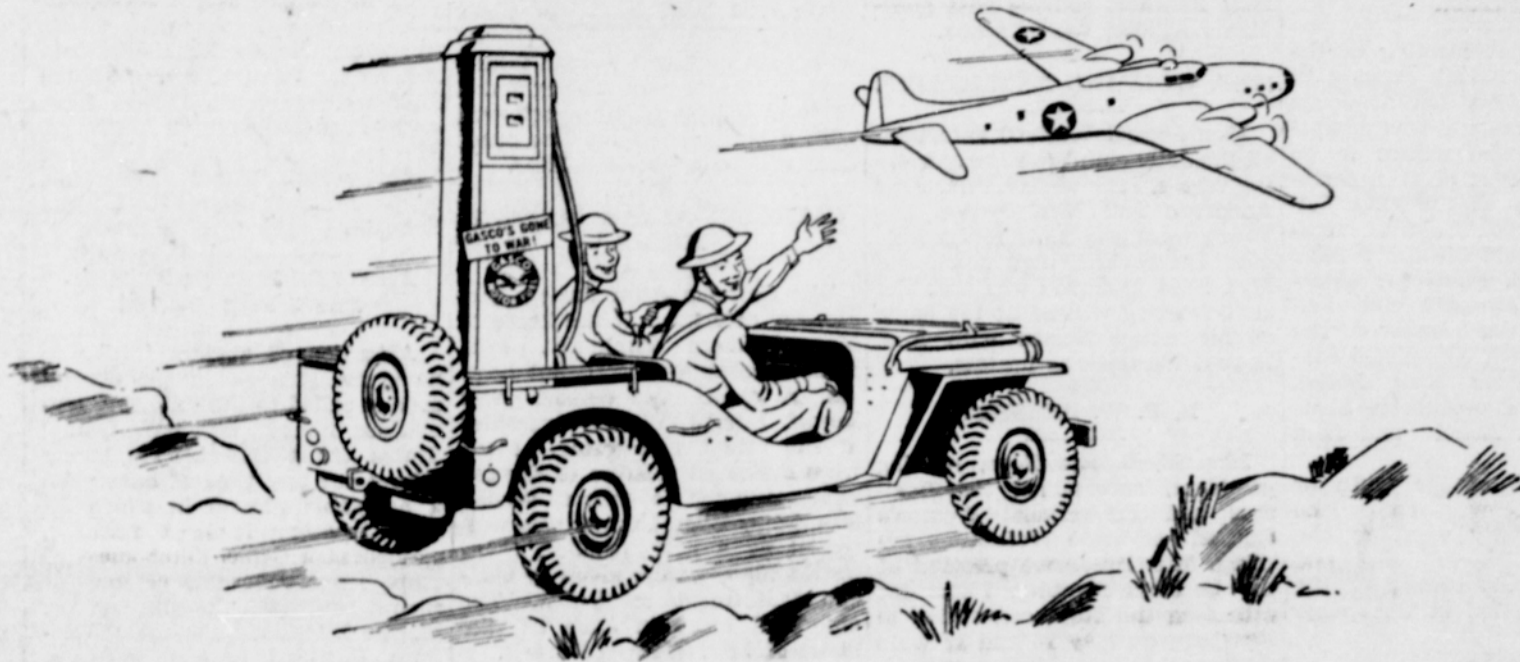
