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Special Notice

Regarding

Emergency Delivery Service

The Director of Defense Transportation has issued a general order curtailing local delivery services as a means of conserving transportation facilities and equipment.

Effective May 15, local carriers are forbidden to make any special deliveries except to hospitals and the armed forces of the United States, and except emergency deliveries of supplies necessary to protect public health, life and safety. Effective May 15, callbacks made in a second attempt to deliver shipments on the same day or to make collections are prohibited, and carriers may not make more than one delivery to any one person in a single day. However, if deliveries to one person are so large as to require more than one vehicle, this may be considered as a single delivery.

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
