**TRAVEL TO ALASKA IS DISCOURAGED.**

The increasing number of applications of private citizens, many of them dependents of persons in military service or employed on military projects, for permission to travel to Alaska has necessitated a statement of policy on the transportation of civilians to the Territory.

The commandant of the thirteenth naval district and the commanding general, western defense command, are discouraging travel of all women and children to Alaska, especially southwestern and Western Alaska, because of the excessive shortage of passenger transportation facilities, the very definite hazard involved, and because subsistence of Alaska is proving increasingly difficult. The nature of the military situation has required, and will continue to require use of all available space in vessels operating between continental United States ports and the Territory of Alaska.
