In the table below, only three offices are listed where candidates had no opposition. Alta King was given a nice complimentary vote as justice of the peace on the republican ballot, as was Joseph Safley for constable on the same ticket. Earl Hill led the republican ticket for representative of the 14th district with a vote of 271.

County USDA Board to Handle Applications for Farm Buildings

The county USDA War Board has been designated to handle applications for construction of farm buildings and agricultural processing plants otherwise prohibited by the war production board's recent building conservation order. Geo. W. Platt, USDA war board chairman, announced yesterday.

To conserve war materials, the WPB has restricted the use of materials for construction which exceeds certain definite limits, the chairman pointed out. Special WPB authorization is necessary before construction can be started, with the following exceptions: Farm residence costing less than \$500; farm buildings, fences, irrigation and drainage structures costing less than \$1000; storage, processing, marketing or other

off-farm facilities for farm products costing less than \$5000.

The order also does not effect construction started before April 9, 1942, ordinary maintenance and repair work, or reconstruction of residences destroyed by fire or other accident after December 31, 1941, the chairman said.

Persons wishing to apply for authorization to begin construction coming within the provisions of the limitation order should apply to O. S. Fletcher, secretary of the county USDA war board at his office in the Producers Public Market building in Eugene. Necessary forms and instructions will be provided applicants.

USDA war boards have been given the responsibility of certifying agricultural construction at the request of the war production

board, Mr. Platt said, in order that such construction may be obtained whenever it is necessary for attainment of agricultural production goals.

AYRES INDUCTED INTO ARMY

Low Ayres, the war-hating Hollywood film actor who sacrificed his career, at least temporarily, for his principles, came out

of a conscientious objectors' camp Monday at Hood River to be inducted into the army.

The actor who rose to prominence as a war-embittered soldier in "All Quiet on the Western Front" said his hatred of arm-bearing was unchanged.

He was entering the army, he said, because he had been assured he would be assigned to medical duty, for which he has taken training in civilian courses.
