Cascara Bark Has Interesting Past

When the Spanish padres pushed northward along the California coast, building the famed Camino Real and numerous Missions, they learned of a native tree whose bark had tonic properties. Believing the tree to be the same as that from whose wood Noah built the Ark, the padres named it Cascara Sagrada, or Sacred Bark.

When Lewis and Clark first journeyed down the Columbia river in 1804, the Coastal Indian tribes were observed to be using a laxative tonic made from the bark of a tree called Chittum Wood. Returning east, the expedition carried seeds of the tree which were given to a Philadelphia botanist named Pursh. In his botanical gardens, Dr. Pursh grew several trees, made extracts from the bark and experimented widely in its use and properties. Later in Paris a pharmacist named M. de Candolle obtained Cascara Bark from Dr. Pursh and continued the experimental work. In honor of these two pioneers the drug is now known botanically as Rhamnus Purshiana de Candolle.

As early as 1870, Cascara extract became known to the medical profession as a constructive tonic laxative, and since that time its use has increased steadily throughout the civilized world. So far as is known, it is one of the few if not the only non-habit-forming laxatives available.

The Cascara tree grows wild in a limited area, the western slopes of southern British Columbia, western Washington and Oregon, and northwestern California. Each summer while the sap is flowing, local residents throughout this area peel, dry and sell through local buying agents, a crop of cascara bark which yields them an average annual income of about \$400,000. The trees are fairly plentiful, especially on land which was logged from 15 to 30 years ago. Cascara seeds itself and grows well among the second growth found on old logging works.

Because of the many new Army and Navy hospitals now in use, demand for cascara bark has materially increased. To bring out a sufficient crop, the price is at a current level of 15c per pound for dry sacked bark, which is highest on record. Peelers are urged to peel all they possibly can, but to conserve future crops and to reduce forest fire hazard, they should observe the following rules:

1. Trees should be felled prior to peeling. New sprouts will spring from the stumps and provide a new crop in a very few years.
2. Trees smaller than 3 inches in diameter should not be peeled.
3. Bark should not be peeled from stumps.
4. Limbs and branches should be peeled down to a diameter of one inch.
5. Peelers should take every precaution against the starting or spreading of fires.
6. Obtain written permission from the land owner.
