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AXIS CRUELTY

For sheer unnecessary cruelty, the Axis leaders can bear comparison with the blood-loving conquerors of antiquity. Additional evidence has been produced to completely substantiate Anthony Eden's almost unbelievable report of what the Japs did in Hongkong. Wanton murder, torture and rape are apparently a definite part of Japanese policy.

In Europe, Hitler is pursuing a similar course. When "crimes" are committed against the Germans in occupied countries, no particular effort is made to find and punish the guilty. Instead, scores and hundreds of innocent people are summarily executed. And the Nazis usually pick victims who have qualities of leadership—in order to further their policy of turning those countries into slave states whose function for all time will be to produce brutish laborers for the New Order. Cold, planned barbarism is part and parcel of the Axis' design for world conquest.

TOO OPTIMISTIC

The only thing that alarmed a war correspondent on his return to America as he traveled about was the optimism of the American people in winning the war quickly. The correspondent found the rate of production of armaments pleasing as well as the general spirit of the public in denying themselves of many peace time conveniences. But he was afraid the people might grow weary of a long struggle and be disappointed if the struggle was prolonged much beyond the expected time.

HELPING THE SCRAP RUBBER CAMPAIGN

Early indications point to the fact that the public will give full cooperation to the campaign to collect scrap rubber. There are a few suggestions to be made aside from collecting waste rubber. Here the public could help materially in keeping broken glass off the streets and curbs. Beer and whiskey drinkers are sometimes careless about throwing away their empties and frequently these empties are thrown on the streets to be broken and run over by the motorists. Street sweepers can not always be on hand to sweep up the broken glass with result that a good many tires are cut and damaged.

The above is another evil resulting from careless drinking and will do its part toward bringing about prohibition.

WHAT TO DO IN A GAS ATTACK

(This has been approved by the Medical Division of the United States Office of Civilian Defense)

1. Serious injury may result from exposure to liquid gas which may fall from airplanes. It is, therefore, imperative to remain indoors and keep the windows closed.

2. War gases are heavier than air. If you are inside a building remain there, and, if possible, go upstairs. Do not complicate the military effort by leaving your house unless circumstances make it absolutely necessary. If you are outside and not able to immediately go indoors walk—do not run—get out of the gas area. Avoid puddles of liquid gas, basements, valleys and other low places.

3. If the windows of your room are broken, go to another room, or get out of the building.

4. If you have been exposed to a war gas (a) Breathe through cloths wet with baking soda solution. (b) If you can go inside a building, do so, but first remove your outer clothing and leave it outside. (c) Wash your hands and then your face with laundry soap and water. (d) Wash your eyes at once with a large amount of a solution of baking soda; one teaspoon of baking soda in a glass of water. (e) Take a bath using plenty of laundry soap. (f) Wash your eyes again with baking soda solution.

5. If splashes of liquid gas have gotten on you (a) Using small pieces of cloth, cleansing tissue or toilet paper, blot up as much of the liquid as you can, being careful not to spread it. (b) Dab the contaminated area with cloths wet with bleaching solutions containing sodium hypo-chlorite, such as elorox, etc. (c) Steps b, c, d, e, and f in 4 above.

6. Do not get excited. Lie down and cover yourself with a blanket. Your Air Raid Warden will summon medical aid.

There is no immediate serious danger from exposure to any known war gas if you follow these simple rules. Clip them out and memorize them.

Mill Fires Must Be Out in 10 Minutes After Black-out

SALEM, June 17 (Special)—Quenching of all mill operator's refuse fires or fires used for the disposal of garbage, refuse or debris and burning within a 50 mile radius of the blackout area must take place within ten minutes' time after an official blackout order has been given, according to instructions issued by Lieutenant J. L. DeWitt, commanding officer, fourth army area.

In a communication to Governor Charles A. Sprague, the commanding officer requested that "For good and sufficient military reasons," that the state forester and officers of the U. S. forest service cooperate fully with the blackout orders and that the forestry agents enforce existing regulations pertaining to fire laws.

Acting in accordance with the existing Oregon fire regulatory setup, Governor Sprague instructed the state forester to carry out the army burning instructions on private forested areas outside incorporated cities; forest service officers, the burning on national forest areas; and the office of the state fire marshal, the burning on incorporated city areas.

Blackout instructions, as issued by the army, apply to all refuse burners operated in either open or closed pits. The communication asks that all such pits be equipped with some device which will effectively eliminate all glow and reflection within the ten minute period and that an adult person be assigned to operate the said device.

State Forester N. S. Rogers, writing to all forest wardens and inspectors, instructed them to contact all operators and others engaged in burning waste materials. He suggested that the fieldmen advise operators of the blackout system for both open and closed burners as perfected by a committee of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association.

Blackout methods developed by the committee are as follows: For the closed burner, a sprinkler system constructed inside of the burner shell approximately 20 feet above the grate is very effective if supplied by a 2½ inch feed pipe from a water system capable of 70 pounds pressure. The sprinkler pipe itself may vary from 2 inches at the intake to three-fourths of an inch at the opposite side of the burner. Sprinkler nozzles should be spaced at intervals not to exceed 8 feet around the burner wall. These should contain one-sixteenth inch flat slot openings.

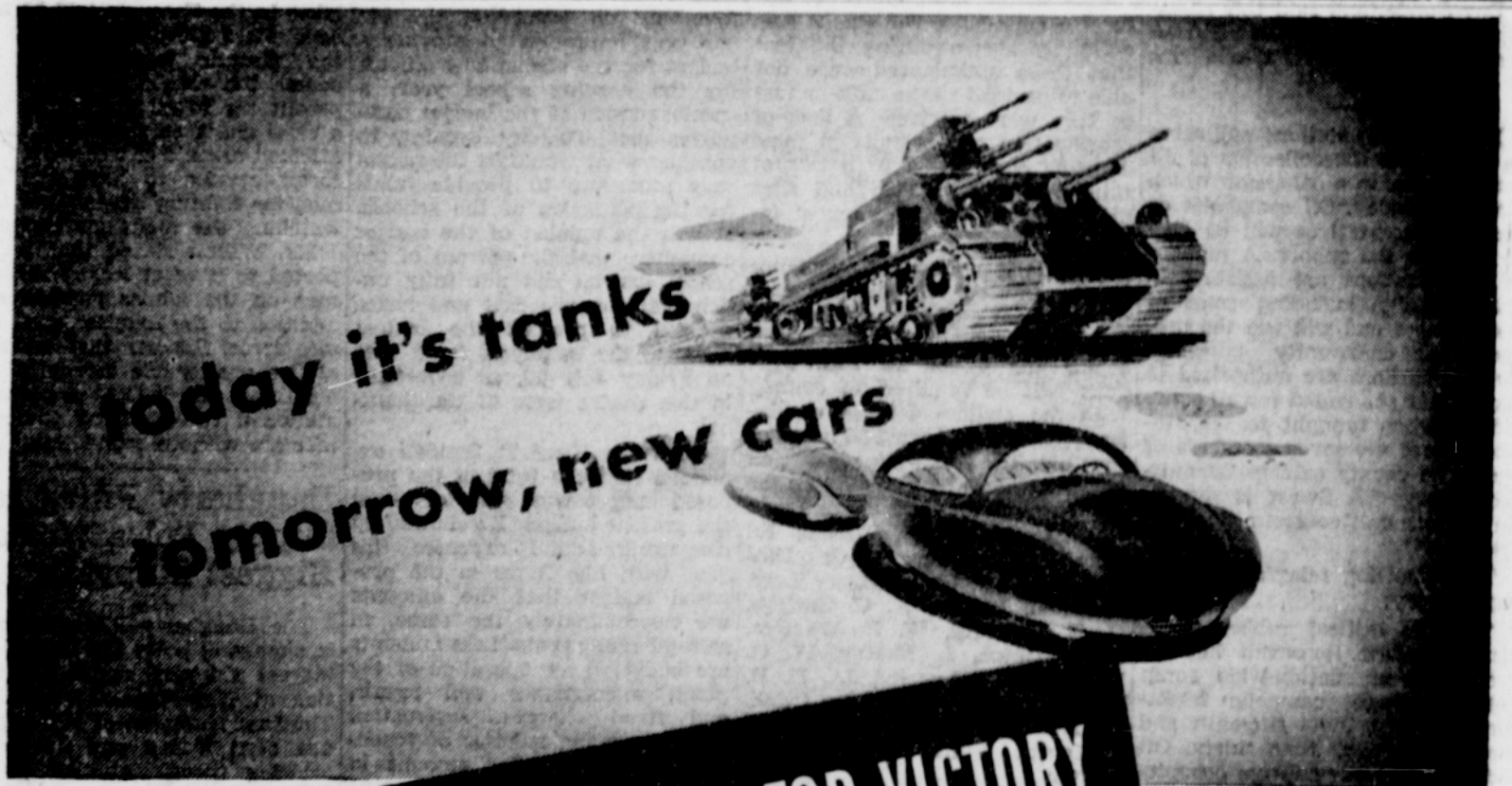
