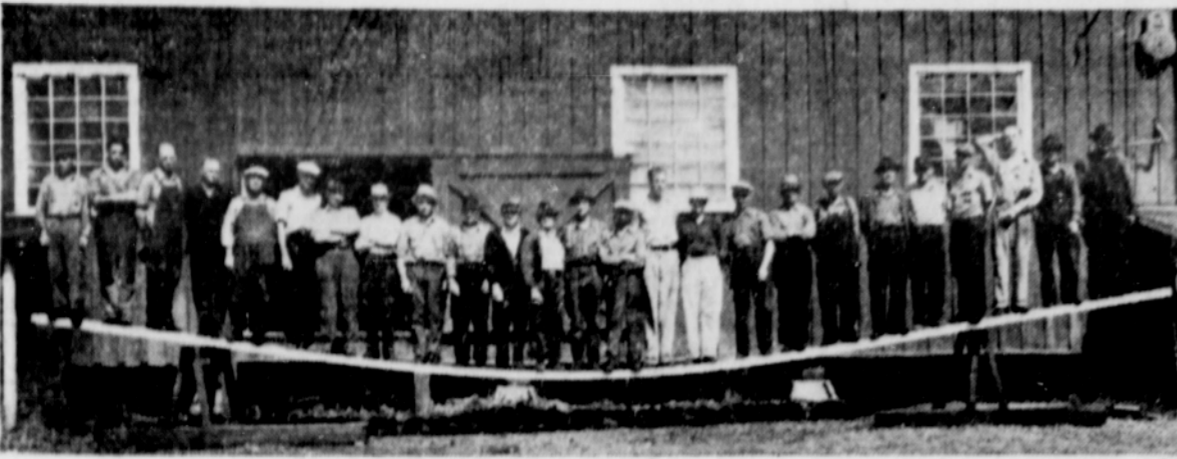


Two Tons of Manpower Test Douglas Fir Airplane Lumber



Twenty-five soldiers of war production, all veterans of the West Coast lumber industry, demonstrate the strength of airplane grade Douglas fir lumber, now a vital element of the big job of beating the Axis by airpower. Early in the war the English discovered that Douglas fir was superior to metal for propellers, and that Sitka spruce was unexcelled for many structural parts of planes. Now both English and American airplane engineers are using hemlock as well as fir and spruce. After years of experiment, a revolutionary method of plywood plane construction has become a sensational success. War supply officials of the United Nations have given the forests and mills of the west coast front rank, beside the ore fields and metal plants of the Great Lakes region, in the army of industrial war production. Each of the twenty-five men pictured here is enlisted in an urgently needed war service.

Lakes in the eastern part of the county yielded fair catches. Good catches were reported made on Waldo lake. Bluebacks are being taken from Mercer and Sutton lakes on Doc Shelton spinner and also from the Siuslaw river on the same lure. There is a small run of Chinook salmon in the Siuslaw river. One was caught August 1, 18 pounds. This run should increase by the end of the week. These fish were taken on a Bear Valley No. 5.

Douglas County: Fishing in the Umpqua river is good especially for trout. Summer steelhead fishing is not at its best at this time although a few are being taken. Fishing in Twin Lakes for Eastern Brook is all that anyone could desire. Fish Lake on the South Umpqua is also good. The small streams are about fished out now and are not so good.

Timely Recipes

Here is a cream version of a peach pie that is delicious:

Peach Cream Pie
2 1/2 tbsp flour
3 tbsp sugar
Few grains salt
Fresh peaches
1 cup milk
1 egg
1/2 tsp vanilla
1/2 cup cream
Mix flour, sugar and salt. Add milk gradually and mix smooth. Cook in double boiler until mixture begins to thicken. Add beaten egg yolk and cook until thick. Cool and add vanilla. Fill a baked pie shell one-half full of sliced peaches. Pour custard mixture over the peaches. Chill. Add cream to the egg white and whip until stiff. Pile lightly on pie.
