### HOP PRICES TO RANGE FROM \$2.50 TO \$3

The U. S. employment service said Tuesday at Portland that the fall hop harvest will be in full swing by August 21, with picking prices varying from \$2.50 to \$3 a hundred pounds.

The top price is offered in the Grants Pass area. Most Willamette valley yards are offering \$2.50.

Growers predicted that the price for cured hops would average 36 cents a pound, compared to last year's 27 1/2 cents.
